

From Superintendent Rob Busch Snow make-up days

Getting our school make-up plan figured out for the 2018-19 school year has become a very challenging task. As soon

as a plan seems to be finalized and ready to be announced, another snowstorm moves in and buries the plan. Mother Nature has shown Iowa school districts who really is in control of schedules and plans.

Iowa schools are required by the State to implement calendars reflecting either a minimum of 180 days or 1,080 hours of instruction. Due to the required length of day, the Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District opted for the 1,080 hours of instruction model. While our 2018-19 school year calendar was scheduled to have 1,112 hours, the missed instructional time up to this point has caused us to fall below the minimum required hours.

With approximately 500 students in the district and many unique family needs, there will be "no one size fits all" and there will be some conflicts in scheduling as we move forward for to meet the required 1080 of instruction. Our original plan was to make up an instructional day on February 18th, we all know how that went.

One of the biggest difficulties Ed-Co deals with is our current length of day. Some school districts have added on 10 to 15 minutes before school and the same to the end of the day. At Ed-Co the situation is very unique. Unofficially our day starts for almost all elementary students at 7:45 and ends at 3:45 (except those that walk or get a ride to and from the elementary). That is one of the longest days around. Now the bad news, officially our school day is from 8:30 until 3:15 - 6 hours and 20 minutes the shortest day I have found. Some of our students are getting on the bus at 6:50 AM.

Personally, I also just dislike just meeting the "state minimum", but this year is a very different year. If you Google, "Iowa, Did you know?," you will understand how important it is for students to "learn to learn" and prepare for the ever-changing future. It is difficult to learn and work on standards without school in session.

The current plan is as follows:

• March 14 – Change to **full instructional day** from an early dismissal.

- March 15 Change to **full instructional day** from a non-instructional day.
- March 26 Change to **2:30 early dismissal** from 1:30 early dismissal.
- March 28 Change to **2:30 early dismissal** from 1:30 early dismissal.
- March 29 Change to 1:30 early dismissal from a non-instructional day.
- April 10 Change to **full instructional day** from an early dismissal.
- May 1 Change to **full instructional day** from an early dismissal.
- Add **full instructional days** on May 24, May 28, May 29, May 30, May 31, June 3, June 4, and June 5th.

The decisions that we have made to address the loss of instructional time will not meet all of the needs of our students, our staff, or our families. It is, however, my hope that we have made the best decision based on our current situation.

An important note: this plan is contingent on the cooperation of the weather! If there are additional full-day cancellations, late starts and/or early dismissals, this plan will be adjusted accordingly.

As always, I ask that you please become involved with the educational opportunities for our young people and assist us in making Edgewood-Colesburg the best school in the State of Iowa. I thank you for taking the time to read these articles as we proceed through a very exciting and snowy 2018-2019 school year. 
Congratulations to Ethan Streicher

Spring Play information



News from Mrs. Bond


The semester has started off a bit roughly with all of the snow days we are receiving. However, we have managed to get some work done in school!

News from Mrs. Anderega

Well, we are more than half way through the school year (finally)! The special education world at the elementary has been busy catching up

on progress monitoring and alternate assessment testing with all the crazy snow days. Because winter testing is almost over, special education teachers are looking closer at student data to see how much progress they've made and whether changes need to be made or not in an IEP (individual education plan) or if instructional changes need to be made.

For students who have an IEP that participate in Iowa Assessments, special education teachers track their progress on a graph. Usually, if there are four or more data points at or above the aim line (a line on their graph showing where we want the student to be toward his or her progress), the IEP goal could be changed or the student could be exited from their IEP. If progress monitoring shows the student below the aim line for more than 4 data points, changes need to be made either to their IEP, or in what the special education teacher is instructing.

For students who have an IEP that participate in

Iowa's Alternate Assessment, the same procedures take place, except they usually are not exited from their IEP. The special education teacher also has to review alternate assessment data and evidence to decide the level the student is currently at.

Depending on the grade level of the student, students on alternate assessment are instructed based off of something called the Iowa Core Essential Elements, which is like the Iowa Core Standards. The Iowa Core Essential Elements are broken down into smaller

steps and different levels. These levels help guide a special education teacher in deciding whether or not to move down or up a level in what a student can do.

Needless to say, the teachers and students have all been working very hard all year long. My favorite part of teaching is seeing student growth, and I have seen a lot this year! I look forward to seeing what strides my students have made come spring.



News from Mrs. Trenkamp

We are always encouraging students to be responsible. Educators agree that responsible children do better in school. Luckily, parents have endless opportunities to foster responsibility. To

boost your child's responsibility:

- Enforce a few age-appropriate rules and consequences. State them clearly so your child knows exactly how you expect her/him to behave—and what will happen if she/he doesn't.
- Trust her/him with meaningful tasks. School-age children are capable of handling responsibilities such as picking up their rooms, setting the table and helping with the laundry.
- Talk about financial responsibility. Many kids receive an allowance. This provides a great opportunity to teach about budgeting, spending, saving and giving.
- Let your child make decisions, such as which homework assignment to tackle first. Having the responsibility of making decisions builds confidence.
- Find ways to help others. Discuss what it means to be a responsible member of a community. Talk about different ways your family can contribute, such as by donating gently-used clothing to a charity or volunteering your time for an important cause.
- Adjust rules and responsibilities. As your child matures, his/her abilities will change. Perhaps he/she can take on more grown-up chores. Or perhaps he/she can make new and exciting decisions. Talk about how great it feels to be responsible!

5th Graders Share Projects




After researching about European explorers, creating a box full of artifacts, pictures, maps, and many fun facts, fifth graders taught their first grade reading buddies about their explorer.

Library News from Mrs. Meyer

The elementary and high school libraries have been busy promoting "reading for enjoyment". There are so many academic benefits for reading for

enjoyment, but did you know that it could also help your social well-being? One thing that it really helps our students do is develop empathy, which is the ability to understand and share the feelings of another. Here is a really great article by Katie Prince, that talks about how reading helps our young people develop this skill.

Research shows reading improves kids' emotional intelligence and increases empathy

Growing up in a small town in Iowa, books were my window to a larger world. I would curl up in our overstuffed floral chair and be transported to a new world–from the 1930s Dust Bowl in Out of the Dust by Karen Hesse to the castle in Ella Enchanted by Gail Carson Levine. Books taught me about people who had different life experiences and grew up in different places than the Midwest.

The author, David Foster Wallace, accurately summarizes the importance of reading fiction and how fiction can help us better understand others, saying, "Fiction is about what it means to be human." This notion that reading can better help us connect to the broader human experience is more than a simple

observation, it has been supported by extensive research. Studies show that reading can help kids build developmental skills of emotional intelligence and empathy, enabling our young readers to better connect with other perspectives and human experiences.

Fiction can increase emotional intelligence

The ability to learn about diversity through reading has been studied extensively, as researchers try to tap into what lifelong readers know as the magic of reading.

According to, researchers at the New School in New York City "found evidence that literary fiction improves a reader's capacity to understand what others are thinking and feeling." The article further argues that literary fiction can "support and teach us values about social behavior, such as the importance of understanding those who are different from ourselves."

The results of this study suggest that readers have greater emotional intelligence and empathy, meaning they can better put themselves in someone else's shoes.

An important concept for parents, volunteers, mentors, and teachers to keep in mind during classroom time and one-on-one sessions with kids. By supporting kids' literacy development and a love of reading, you will in turn foster their emotional growth as you read and discuss fiction with them.

Stories and human connection

The notion that reading is a valuable skill for building social awareness and empathy is echoed by many authors who know and love this magical, important part of reading.

In an interview with Lit Hub, author Sunil Yapa says, "Empathy is a radical act, particularly when you use it to connect with people who are very different from you. Loving others is wonderful, but caring for others is profound...Empathy is a profound act of imagination and human connection. In fiction, we imagine ourselves into other people's experiences. Of course, another word for that is 'reading.'"

Whether fiction or nonfiction, reading offers a unique experience to become engrossed in the stories and life experiences of the characters in the book.

Providing readers with the opportunity to connect with other worldviews.

Applying this research in practice

Giving children an array of diverse choices of fiction

will not only help them become better readers, but will encourage them to be more empathetic people. Books can be a window into different worlds for our students, just like they were for me growing up. The opportunity to strengthen each student's empathy through reading is an exciting prospect. Stories matter, and understanding others matters.

Encourage your children to read, it is so very important for their social and emotional development, and a great place to get books to encourage this is the library!

Use of Recording Device Notice

Students and parents are hereby notified that the content of the recording may be used in a student disciplinary proceeding. The content of the recording are confidential student records and will be retained with other student records. Recordings will only be retained if necessary for use in a student disciplinary proceeding or other matter as determined necessary by the administration. Parents may request to view the recording of their child if the recordings are used in a disciplinary proceeding involving their child. A parent may view the recordings without consent from any student or parent of a minor student also shown in the recording if the other students are bystanders. But if there is an altercation between multiple students, then all parents must give consent in order for the recordings to be viewed by parents.
