Carson Kirby, trumpet and Hunter Thompson, trombone were accepted into the Eighth Grade Honor Band.



# News from Mrs. McCool

It's hard to believe, but I have surpassed 20 years of teaching, much of it in the field of special education. Over those years, I have seen many

positive changes, along with some things that continue unchanged. After three years of substitute teaching locally, I was hired as an elementary special education teacher here at Ed-Co. My first year, there were 28 students on my roster, basically the size of a general education class list. While numbers have decreased over the years, I credit that to improved teacher training, allowing for differentiated learning, meaning students are given many different opportunities for acquiring learning. Still, there are students who struggle with learning.

Recognizing that universal principle, the district has taken noticeable measures to improve student learning. From interventions targeted specifically at individual learner needs to a new series focusing on skills and strategies rather than simple memorization to additional learning programs for recognized subcategories of students, today's education is much different than that of a mere 20 years ago. Likewise, Ed-Co Elementary has adopted a new curriculum of seven habits for highly effective learning that provides a new mindset for future success. Students are expected to be proactive, begin with the end in mind, put first things first, think winwin, seek first to understand, then to be understood, synergize, and sharpen the saw. Learning and applying these habits will give our students advantages for life, not only in educational endeavors, but also in workplace success, potential relationships, and most importantly, in interactions with and teaching their own future children.

Knowing all of these new happenings in our building, I can't wait to see what the next 20 years will bring! I have a friend currently struggling with her daughter's special education service provider, having moved from a local district that they were unhappy with to a larger district that they are even unhappier with. It makes me appreciate what we can have and can offer our students as a small, local district. With my own child at Ed-Co, I know not everything is perfect or will be, as is life, but I see the amazing efforts put forth by a staff who truly cares and wants the best for each and every learner, and I am extremely grateful and proud to be part of the Ed-Co community. # News from Ms. Johnson

In technology at the elementary we are currently working with Code.org and Scratch. Last year, I was able to go to a coding workshop and learn tools

to help our students grasp the concept of coding and learned games to help students understand how coding relates to things they do every day. I am excited to share that with some of the games I learned from the workshop and implemented into class time, even the youngest students in preschool and kindergarten are able to

participate and begin understanding the concept of coding.

All of the elementary students have worked on grade level tasks or games in class to understand what code is and learn words like algorithm (a list of steps) and loop (repeating something over and over again). When playing the games on Code.org or using Scratch the students are able to understand the code language as it is used throughout the games or activities used in class. One thing I enjoy about Code.org is many of the games students play have characters that are familiar to the students.

In preschool, students have been working on learning what the words code and program mean. Students even got to "program" Mrs. Askeland and Miss Mary so they would walk on the X's and to the square! Preschoolers have been working with the *Kodable* game off of Code.org. Kindergarten through 2<sup>nd</sup> grade students are excited to help characters from the movie "Moana" steer their boats and catch fish.

In 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 6<sup>th</sup> grades, the students have been introduced to Scratch. Like Code.org, Scratch teaches basic computer programming to the students. With Scratch, students have the freedom to choose the character (or sprite), decide how far and fast the character will move, and have the character speak or make a noise. The students spent some class time following tutorials to gain a better understanding of what each command does and were also given the opportunity to try out their own ideas as well.

If you want to learn more you can go to Code.org or Scratch (scratch.mit.edu) and have your students show you what they can do or even try it for yourself!





# <u>News from Mr. Busch</u> The Good, the Bad and the Ugly of School Finance.

The February 7<sup>th</sup> bond referendum has shined additional light on school funding issues in the Edgewood-

Colesburg Community School District. What makes the conversations so very difficult to comprehend are the various funding streams that school districts operate from. The two areas of current focus are the general fund and the debt service (bond issue). The **general fund** revenues come from state aid, property taxes, income surtaxes, federal funds, grants, and donations. Theses dollars are used to pay staff, energy cost, curriculum and supplies, and transportation costs. The key elements are number of students and the State set cost per student for the general fund. **Debt service** funds are used to cover the cost of the construction of buildings from property tax. Property valuations in the school district are key for the debt service.

Over the past three fiscal years – FY15, FY16 and FY17 – the school board has taken action annually to pre-pay principal on the original bonds, reducing overall interest repayment costs to our taxpayers. Through that prudent process of the board, the total interest cost on that final payment due in FY2018 has been reduced by \$20,475.

The Iowa Legislature annually determines the state cost per pupil, which pays for the annual cost of doing business in Iowa schools. In recent years, Iowa's state cost per pupil has experienced record low increases. In six of the last seven years, the rate of growth in the state cost per pupil has been lower than the cost increases typically experienced by school districts.

Ed-Co's general fund is currently financially strong. Ed-Co's Unspent Authorized Budget (UAB) percentage is in the top 71 schools in Iowa. The estimate for FY16 is at 25.6%. The recommended percentage is between 5-15%. With a decline in enrollment and low increases in the growth of cost per pupil the district must take measures to "right size."

Two factors that have negative effects on the general fund are transportation cost and inequity funding per student. Due to the configuration of our district, we spend approximately \$130,000 above the average to transport our students and this comes from our general fund. Another issue that affects Ed-Co is the cost per pupil. For the 2016-17 school year, 164 districts are at the state minimum per pupil of \$6,591. Unfortunately, Ed-Co is one of those. The maximum is \$6,766, which is \$175 higher per student. If Ed-Co had access to this funding it would be an additional \$70,000. There is currently a class action suit brought by families in the Davenport School District addressing this inequity. As with any budget, it is better to make adjustments before there is a crisis. Please contact legislators to continue to address this concern.

If approved, the proposed project will be completed from the debt service fund. These improvements should deliver relief for the general fund by lowering the energy cost. The project would also provide a more secure and comfortable learning environment. The investment in facilities will continue to draw the strong open enrollment into the school district, which is keeping the program offerings for all students viable. The district will continue to find ways to think creatively about delivering programs and working with other districts, but keeping facilities up to date is an investment in the future that will improve our district's ability to work with others down the road.
