

High School News

<u>News from Mrs. Ostwinkle</u> Spring is in our sights! Congratulations

to Korey Gregory who was chosen by Mrs. Ostwinkle for Student of the Week. Korey is a positive part of the classroom, has a great sense of humor, and is

excited to try and learn new things. Glad you're here, Korey!

First of all, in Instructional Strategies (IS), all students continue to do a Daily Write on our classroom blog. Each day's assignment could be anything from writing a legislator, creating a Haiku, writing a story, creating dialogue for photos, or describing something mysterious. Like reading, writing daily is beneficial to promote student ease. I want students to write down what they think and then edit. Too many spend too much time thinking, afraid they will write the wrong thing. My goal is to get them to write as they think. Just write! I tell them you can't create a clay pot if you don't have clay to work with in the first place. Once they have put words on paper, they have something to work with.

Second, in IS and English, several students have been reading the series Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children. We are now on the third and last book of the series and we are so excited to continue reading every day that they are almost ready to start before the bell rings. It's so rewarding to see that kind of enthusiasm about reading and literature!

Third, in Science, we have been learning about the Human Body, researching the brain, lungs, and heart so far this semester. There is always someone who says, "I didn't know that" about some fact or other. Sometimes it is Mrs. Ostwinkle! When there are questions that are difficult to answer, we stop and spend time using our resources to find the answer and share it.

Fourth, Math students still work on the ALEKS online program, but we also spent several weeks working on a program called "Pennies to Paychecks," in which we spent quite a bit of time learning about how money works in real life (Checking, Savings, Paychecks, Taxes, and Investing, This was a really valuable lesson to all of us.

Lastly, Mrs. Ostwinkle and Mrs. Burns attended a five-day autism training put on by Keystone AEA in

Dubuque. We have incorporated what we learned throughout our whole room. We have separate sections in our room for Living, Learning, and Working. Several students have visual schedules and do selected work tasks every day. These can be assembling things and following directions, putting together puzzles, sorting, measuring, working with money, or using tools. All of these tasks are setup in boxes in a cupboard labeled with the alphabet and numbers 1-10. Students check their schedule and go and get their work task, perform the task while being supervised, having a teacher assess their work, then returning the box to the cupboard and going on to the next thing. This is a great way to practice going to work, following directions, and taking personal responsibility and recognition for success.

We work very hard to maintain a positive learning environment, a sense of being part of a team, and making what we do enjoyable—this way everyone wants to come back every day! We have a few snow days under our belt (and I believe I enjoy those as much as students) and are ready to finish the year strong, even if a little later than expected. We've got a lot to do before summer break and we're up to the task. And--congratulations to the Ed-Co Boys Basketball Team for taking the whole school with you to state! We are so proud!

4th quarter will bring the 8th graders into the Ag department for the second year and they will be studying careers and the history of agriculture and why it is important.






February Viking Values reward

News from Mrs. George

Beginning in January we started our K-6 Art Curriculum with a unit on Textiles & Weaving. Each grade level produced a project that incorporated fabric, yarn, or

paper to produce a product that had a woven feel with actual texture. Our 6th grade students wove baskets using natural materials with wooden bases. Their projects are on display at the new Edgewood Museum. The 5th grade students used varn and cardboard looms to create small rugs, wall hangings, and cup coasters. Our 4th grade students used metal looms to create pot holders for Valentines gifts. In 3rd grade students learned about actual and implied texture to produce paper woven scarves that they used to adorn a wooly sheep. Our sheep are on display in the Elementary Library. In 2nd grade students created Mosaic Collages using vintage postage stamps, tissue paper, and fabric scraps. They learned the difference between random and intended methods for creating collage and mosaic art. Our 1st grade students are using green berry baskets to create a spring basket using scrap ribbon and yarn with a repeated pattern. The Kindergarten class also had a chance to experiment with fabric and other media to create a random collage/mosaic project for Valentine's Day.

With each project students keep a personal sketch pad to draw and plan their assignment before they are given materials to work with. With each project we talk about the Elements of Good Design: line, color, shape, texture, space, and form. We also discuss what makes our projects or artwork interesting for others to see or the Principals of Good Design: unity, emphasis, balance, variety, pattern, proportion, and rhythm. When possible, students have the opportunity to talk about their work and present it to their peers. Because we are a literature based art program, with every project we tie in a literature component. The more connections we can make using our artwork, whether it's with literature, social studies, math, or science, the more enriched experience students will have in exploring all subject areas.

Things are going well in 4th grade! We had a few visitors to our rooms this past month. First, Osborne came and talked to us and showed us examples of the various landforms in our "Driftless

Area". We had been learning about landform regions across the U.S. and it was neat to understand why we have the landforms that we have in our own area.

Use of Recording Device Notice

The Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District Board of Directors has authorized the use of recording devices on school premises and district buses. The recording devices will be used to monitor student behavior to maintain order and to promote and maintain a safe environment. Recordings of students in the classroom will also be used to improve educational practices. Students and parents are hereby notified that the content of the recording may be used in a student disciplinary proceeding. The content of the recording are confidential student records and will be retained with other student records. Recordings will only be retained if necessary for use in a student disciplinary proceeding or other matter as determined necessary by the administration. Parents may request to view the recording of their child if the recordings are used in a disciplinary proceeding involving their child. A parent may view the recordings without consent from any student or parent of a minor student also shown in the recording if the other students are bystanders. But if there is an altercation between multiple students, then all parents must give consent in order for the recordings to be viewed by parents.
