One of the most important things to do for your children over the summer is to keep them reading. Research shows that most children experience a "summer

slide" over the summer. Reading is like any other skill, you need to practice it to improve. Here is a great article giving parents tips to prevent that "summer slide" in reading.

Three Ways to Prevent Summer Slide.

Many children, especially struggling readers, forget some of what they've learned or slip out of practice during the summer months. Try these strategies to help your reader improve her reading during the summer and beyond:

Six books to summer success: Research shows that reading just six books during the summer may keep a struggling reader from regressing. When choosing the six, be sure that they are just right — not too hard and not too easy. Take advantage of your local library. Ask for help selecting books that match your child's age, interests, and abilities. Libraries often run summer reading programs that motivate kids to read, so find out what's available in your area. Also check our book lists for recommendations.

Read something every day: Encourage your child to take advantage of every **opportunity** to read. Find them throughout the day:

Morning: The newspaper — even if it is just the comics or today's weather.

Daytime: Schedules, TV guides, magazines, online resources, etc. For example, if your daughter likes the food channel, help her look for a recipe on the network's Web site — then cook it together for more reading practice.

Evening: End the day by having your child read to you from the book he is currently reading (one of the six books, above). Have him rehearse a paragraph, page, or chapter before reading to you. Rereading will help him be more fluent — able to read at an appropriate speed, correctly, and with nice expression.

Keep reading aloud: Reading aloud benefits all children and teens, especially those who struggle. One benefit is that you can read books your child can't, so she will build listening comprehension skills with grade-level and above books. This will increase her knowledge and expand her experience with text, so that she will do better when she reads on her own.

It's hard to keep up a reading routine in a season packed with distractions and diversions. These suggestions will fit into a busy schedule and make reading fun!

D.A.R.E. envisions a world in which students everywhere are empowered to respect others and choose to lead lives free from violence, substance abuse, and other dangerous behaviors. They must go through 10 sessions of trainings where they learn problem-solving and coping skills.

In math, the 6th graders have been working really hard. The students just finished their chapter on relationships between variables in algebra. Next, they will start working on using formulas to find the area of different shapes and figures.

<u>District News</u> Iowa's high school graduation rate is 91%

Iowa's high school graduation rate continues to show long-term progress, although the state experienced a slight decrease in 2017, according to figures released today by the Iowa Department of Education.

State data show 91 percent of students in Iowa's Class of 2017 graduated within four years, down from 91.3 percent for the Class of 2016. Since 2011, Iowa's four-year graduation rate has climbed 2.7 percentage points overall, with significant long-term gains in nearly every student demographic subgroup (see chart below). For example, graduation rates for African American students have increased four years in a row and by 9.1 percentage points since 2011. Iowa has set a 95 percent goal for the statewide graduation rate.


"High school graduation is an essential step for every student because it opens the door to postsecondary education and training opportunities that lead to rewarding jobs," Iowa Department of Education Director Ryan Wise said. "While I'm disappointed in this one-year decrease, our long-term trend is still on the rise and I'm confident we have the right roadmap in place for education."

Iowa graduation rates are calculated with a formula established by the U.S. Department of Education. Unique student identification numbers allow school districts to account for all ninth-grade students as they move through high school. At the state level, the method helps determine when a student graduates, even if the student has switched districts in Iowa during high school.

Iowa's five-year graduation rate – which reflects students who were part of a graduating class but took an extra year to finish high school – was 93.4 percent for the Class of 2016, up from 93.3 percent for the Class of 2015.

Iowa's annual dropout rate reflects the percentage of students in grades 9-12 who drop out of school during a single year. The annual dropout rate remained at 2.8 percent from the 2015-16 school year to the 2016-17 school year. The state's 2016-17 dropout rate represents 4,183 students in grades 9 through 12.

The following graphic shows a comparison of Iowa's annual dropout rates dating back to the 2010-11 school year:

Summer 2018 should be an exciting one for **building** and grounds improvements for the Ed-Co School District. The Board has approved a bid to replace numerous windows and doors in the elementary and secondary buildings beginning as soon as school is dismissed for the summer. Quotes are also being reviewed for improvements for bathroom remodels and parking lot expansions. I would love to come and talk to any group about things happening in our district.

I would like to thank all the **volunteers** we have had in the past calendar year. It takes a lot of people donating time to make our school and students successful. From helping at preschool and kindergarten centers, providing activities at post prom, or working in the concession stands at numerous activities, I want you to know your assistance is greatly appreciated. With numerous track meets coming up, volunteers will continue to play an important role.

The 2018 Iowa Legislation is finishing up with the main sticking points being funding issues. The district has benefited from equity legislation passed this session. The student equity added five dollars per pupil. Transportation equity will add \$130,000 to the budget next year. Increases in state supplemental state aid have lagged behind with 1% increase. Iowa's state cost per pupil has experienced record low increases. In eight of the last nine years, the rate of growth in the state cost per pupil has been lower than the cost increases typically experienced by school districts. Extension of the SAVE (state penny) and operational sharing funding are two very important funding streams yet to be extended.
