### **Ed-Co STEAM Club Attends Tech Summit**

The last month of school will be busy. Because we could not have our  $3^{\rm rd}$  and  $5^{\rm th}$  grade symphony field trip this year, the Dubuque Symphony has posted a virtual concert for us to enjoy.  $3^{\rm rd}$  graders are studying the instruments of the orchestra. The  $5^{\rm th}$  graders are studying American Composers. Both groups will view the virtual concert at the conclusion of the unit.

Another fun activity this month is the guitar unit. We have a classroom set of guitars from AEA that we will be using in 4<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> grade. Students will be learning some guitar basics. It will be a fun and exciting final month of school!



### <u>Elementary Art News</u> <u>from Mrs. George</u>

Spring has been a busy time for our Elementary Art students. We were asked by the Ed-Co Pride Committee to create

class wide projects for the Ed-Co Pride Auction.

Junior Kindergarten students used their thumbprints to create small flowers on a small vintage dresser. Each students' name appears by their flower. The dresser is chocolate brown with colorful flowers done with acrylic paint.

The Kindergarten class used a vintage school desk to create a Garden Chair. Each kindergarten student used their thumbprint to make a colorful caterpillar

on the legs and arms of the chair. Students' names appear by each image. The chair is complete with an all season birdhouse feeder in the shape of a oneroom schoolhouse. We have also added a water pan, birdseed, and a vintage book about butterflies.

The first grade students combined both classes to create a Fishing Chair. The students used their handprints dipped in acrylic paint to create individual fish on the back and seat portion of a slate blue patio chair. It comes with a fishing hat and two fishing poles for young children.

The second grade classes used their handprints to create two watercolor murals. These projects were done using watercolor paints, crayon, and marker. Each mural has a black background with added heart shaped cutouts.

The third grade classes voted on how to use their handprints to create a Patriotic Mural. They came up with handprints in red, white, and blue when placed together make a pinwheel. Both of these murals can be displayed year round and would make a great gift to a veteran or someone working in the military.

The fourth and fifth grade students were inspired by works of art by Gustav Klimt. Klimt was the famous muralist who created the Tree of Life. These students created miniature feather shapes that had an original design pattern. These small feathers were placed together to create 3 exotic birds. The fifth grade birds are on large canvases using only black, white, and gray colors. The 4th grade 3 panel bird mural uses gold and vibrant colors.

Finally, the 6<sup>th</sup> grade students 'projects were inspired by being respectful of our planet. They used found items to be the foundation of their projects. Students constructed 2 potting stations using old computer carts, pallets, and paint. Students painted designs on individual pots for each cart. Each potting station has garden tools, seeds, gloves, and garden hats. Students also had time to create a "Spring" garden sign using an old pallet and each of their thumbprints for small flowers in their design.



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### News from Mrs. McCool

With ISASPs completed in the building, it feels like the year is winding down quickly. This is typically the time of year parents ask for tips to keep kids learning

over the summer. Here are some suggestions to maintain skills over the summer. Please forgive how wildly specific they seem – they're topics of conversation that came up with students over the past couple of weeks.

Reading: Read about caring for a new pet, like a ferret or a puppy. Read the directions on the back of food packaging (the picture directions count, too!) or recipe. Read the instructions manual for a tractor. Read the packaging on a new toy. Read the street signs and other signage on the way to a hotel. Read the rules at the water park. Read a book to a younger sibling or grandparent you get to see again. Read the fine print on the back of a gift card. Read the junk mail. Read up about a disability that interests or applies to you.

Mathematics: Determine what time you'll need to start a meal to eat at a certain time. Determine how long softball practice is in hours and minutes if you know the starting and ending times. Determine how many miles you travel to a game. Determine how much change and what coins you'll get back after dining out or shopping. Count the coins or money in a wallet or change jar. Determine the cost per person at a hotel. Determine the mileage to visit relatives far away or to go on vacation again. Measure a rough inch as the distance on your thumb from knuckle to tip and a rough yard as the distance from the middle of your nose to the tips of your finger. Measure ingredients in a recipe with smaller measures to get a feel for why different measures are used and how larger measures speed up the measuring process. Measure your living space in feet, and then convert to inches or vice versa. Time yourself doing common chores to get a feel for a one-minute or a five-minute increment. Determine the age of a teacher who has been visiting or living in this town for nearly half a century.

Writing: Write directions for caring for a pet. Write directions for foods you know how to cook. Print out the letters for a younger sibling to trace or copy. Write an online review of a toy, with adult supervision. Write in a diary. Write a letter to someone you haven't seen in a while to tell him or

her how much you miss or appreciate him or her. Write a letter to yourself, identifying your emotions about the pandemic and how you've successfully handled it. Start a Christmas or birthday wish list. Begin a journal of summer activities, because you know someone at school is going to ask what you did over the summer, and that someone is probably going to be me.

Science and Social Studies: Go outside and explore nature, seeing how many birds, trees, or flowers you can identify. Go visit a state or local park. Experience your five senses. Bake. Visit a local museum. Ask your older relatives about how towns have changed since they were little. Have them remember back when and tell you about "the good old days". Watch a YouTube video or a classic movie.

Social Emotional Learning: Look through family pictures. Cuddle. Talk with people. Draw. Craft. Color. Dance. Sing. Whistle. Say, "Please" and "Thank you". Nap. Do whatever makes your heart happy and brings joy to your life.

I found this great article about ways to read and write this summer. There are ideas for every week. Enjoy!

### Week 1: Celebrate summer

- Write a list of things you want to do this summer. Don't forget to include reading!
- Make a chart to keep track of all the books you read this summer.
- Write down on your calendar the time the sun sets today.
- Start a summer scrapbook. Include souvenirs of any trips you take, photos, ticket stubs, and projects you work on during the summer.
- List all the books by your favorite author. See how many you can read this summer.
- Swap books with a friend. Keep sharing books throughout summer.
- Take a walk. Write about or draw the things you see that show summer is here.

### Week 2: Keep in touch

- Make a personal phone book. List phone numbers and addresses of your friends and relatives.
- Design your own stationery and write a letter to a friend.
- Start a journal with a friend or relative. Take turns writing in it all summer long. You can even do this by mail or e-mail.
- Write a letter to your favorite author. A librarian can help you find a postal or e-mail address.
- Draw a picture postcard of an imaginary place. On the back, write a message. Mail it to a friend or relative or put it in your scrapbook.
- The first U.S. postage stamps were designed in 1847. Be a philatelist. Design your own stamp.
- Word game! Invent a code (A=1, B=2, for example). Send a message in code to a friend.

### Week 3: Discover recipes for fun

- List all the ice cream flavors you can think of. Now put them in A-BC order.
- Invent a recipe for a cool summer drink.
   Write it on a recipe card. Serve the drink to your friends.
- Go to the library and find a cookbook. Make the most interesting dish in the book.

- Read the directions on a box of gelatin. Ask a parent if you can help make dessert tonight.
- Work up an appetite by reading a story about food. Make and eat the food you read about

### Week 4: Travel the world

- If you are going on a family vacation this summer, read about your trip. Mark your travel route on a map.
- Pretend you are going to visit another city, state, or country with a friend or relative.
   Write to the tourist bureau for more information. If you plan to visit a foreign country, write to the embassy. Visit the library and find books about the place you want to visit. Or search online for information. Plan your itinerary – and don't forget to check the weather!
- Pick an important news event from another city, state, or country. Find as much information on the topic as possible read newspapers, listen to the radio, and watch TV news. Talk about what you learned.
- Word game! Look for out-of-state license plates. Make a list of all the state names and slogans. Decide which ones you like the best. Ask friends and relatives which are their favorites.

### Week 5: Enjoy the great outdoors

- Pick wildflowers and press them between the pages of a heavy book until the end of summer.
- Plan a backyard camping trip with a friend.
   List all the things you will need to survive.
- Plan a family 'booknic' at your favorite outdoor spot, such as the beach, a park, or the woods. Pack lunch and plenty to read.
- Collect shells at the beach or rocks along a trail. Use a nature guide to identify them.
- Find something small enough to put in your pocket. Write or tell a story about it.
- Look for shapes and designs in the clouds.
   Draw them.
- Word game! Make a list of words to describe fireworks.

### Week 6: Visit fun places

 An animal has escaped from the zoo! Make up a story about it. Tell it to a friend or

- family member or write it down. Add pictures, if you'd like.
- What museums are close to your house? Are there any old, historic buildings in the area? Find these places on a map. Find out what is on exhibit at the museums and why the old buildings are important.
- Go back in time and pretend you lived in or did business in the oldest building in your area. Write a story about how you spent your time.
- Make a list of zoo animals. Sort them by different categories, such as type of animal (mammals, fish, etc.) or coloring (green, brown, striped, etc.).
- Visit the zoo with friends or relatives and find the animals on your list.
- Visit a museum or historical building with friends or relatives. Write a list of things you see that you didn't expect.
- Word game! Think of the softest animal or the oldest thing you've ever touched. Write a poem about it, but don't use the word soft or old.

### Week 7: Become a publisher

- Make your own joke book. Collect jokes and riddles from your family and friends.
- Cut out pictures from an old magazine or catalog. Write a story about them.
- Create a rebus story (a story that uses pictures to represent words). Write a short story, and then substitute pictures (that you draw or cut out) for some of the words.
- Start a round-robin story. Write the beginning, then ask friends to add to it until it has an ending.

### Week 8: Watch the skies

- Learn what birds live in your area. (Birds are described in books called Field Guides.)
   Wake up early to go bird watching and list the birds you see.
- Which constellations can you see on a clear summer night? Look at the sky using a star guide to help you find the constellations.
- People have been looking at the skies for generations. Ask a grandparent or a much older friend to tell you a story about his or her childhood.
- The first UFO was reported in 1947. Read a science fiction book in honor of it.

• Word game! Baseballs also fly through the sky in summer. Find a list of baseball teams in the sports section of the newspaper. Put them in A-B-C order.

### Week 9: Design something big

- Invent a tool to help you do chores more easily. Draw a picture of it or make it from some old junk.
- Read aloud the names of some of the cars in the classified section of your newspaper.
   Design a new car and name it.
- Walk around your neighborhood and look at the houses. Design a house that would best suit your lifestyle.
- Design your own board game and write the rules.
- Everything we use was designed by someone. Start a collection of things you like, or add to a collection you already have. Use a guide to learn the value of your collection.

### Week 10: Honor summer's end

- Remember the wildflowers you pressed between the pages of a heavy book? Remove them, and put them in your summer scrapbook or paste them on heavy paper to make a bookmark.
- Review the chart you made to track the books you read this summer. Pick new books to read.
- Notice what time the sun sets today.
   Compare it to the time the sun set during week one.
- Make a list of the supplies you need for school. Start shopping.
- Plan an end-of-summer celebration. Write a list of the 10 best things you did this summer. Design a menu of your favorite summer treats.
- Word game! Summer days are the longest days of the year. List the longest words you know
- Have a safe and fun summer with lots of reading! Can't wait to see you next fall within two newly remodeled libraries!

Thank you so much for all that you've done to keep our students healthy this year. I know it's been a challenge. We're almost to the end of another school year!

Looking ahead, there are a lot of current  $6^{\rm th}$  grade and  $11^{\rm th}$  grade students that will need their vaccines before next school year. If you have questions, please call me and I can tell you what they need. You can always check in with their medical providers as well.

Also, 9th graders (current 8th graders) will need to have a dental screening done. If you need the form, I'd be happy to get it to you. Your dentist's office should have the form as well. This screening must be completed by a dental hygienist or dentist.

Next year's third graders will also need a vision screening, required by the state. Last year, I was not able to screen the second graders due to the end of the year being cancelled by COVID. I will do my best to screen this year's second graders, but if they are seeing their medical providers for their well child visits, please request a vision screening.



### News from Superintendent Busch

On April 22 around 3:40pm a student was hit by a car while crossing Highway 3 just east of the high school parking lot driveway. Thankfully the student was

uninjured but this could have ended up much worse.

The question is "How could this have been prevented?" and "How can we prevent this or something much worse from happening in the future?". If you are parking on the south side of Highway 3 or in Wood's Edge parking lot to drop off or pick up students please **STOP**. If everyone follows the school's protocol by using the student drop off/pick up area at the north end of the bus loading zone in the school parking lot. Let's work together to make sure every child gets home safely every day.

People dropping off and picking up students are not to park on the south side of Highway 3 or in the Woods Edge golf course parking lot. Also there is no parking adjacent to the bus loading zone along and south of the bus garage.

There is also no parking in front the District office because it is now part of the loading zone. Where there are yellow diagonal lines this area is for "Buses Only". No foot traffic or other vehicle traffic is allowed. In the mornings please drop off students at the north end of the loading zone (by the District office) so the students can walk the sidewalk along the east side of the buses and have direct access to the entrance doors.

For picking up students in the afternoon, please park north of the school building in the school parking lot (again not south of Highway 3). One more change is the parking lot has been converted to "ONE WAY TRAFFIC FLOW" at all times. Traffic flow will be from south to north. Enter off Highway 3 and exit by the swimming pool.
