

Free Meals for All Students Ends With the 2022 School Year

When the 2021-2022 school

year ends, so do free meals for every student. While the federal government funded a program that allowed all students access to free meals during the COVID-19 pandemic, Congress recently declined to continue funding this program. This means all families will need to carry a positive balance in their children's school meal accounts when school begins next fall.

We understand this change may cause you to worry. There are important steps you can take today to make sure your student receives the meals they need next year.

1. Complete An Application for Free and Reduced Meals NOW.

If your student qualifies for free or reduced meals, they can still receive them next year, but you must take action to make it happen. Complete the <u>2021-2022 online application for</u> <u>free and reduced meals</u> before the end of this school year *if you have not already filled out an application for the 2021-2022 school year.* This will give you a 30-day grace period at the start of the 2022-2023 school year to complete another application for next year. The application is available in English and Spanish

- 2. Then, fill out the 2022-2023 online application which will be available on the District's website after July 1, 2022. Even if you complete the 2021-2022 application, you will still need to complete the 2022-2023 application as well.
- 3. Budget for the Cost of School Lunches (if you do not qualify for free and reduced meals).
- 4. Families that do not qualify for free or reduced meals can start depositing money into their student's <u>IMC Lunch Account</u> to prepare for the cost of school lunches next year. Information on meal prices for the 2022-2023 school year will be available in the near future.
- 5. Pay Off Negative School Lunch Balances.

As we prepare to close the books on another academic school year I want to encourage parents to support summer learning at home. Students of all ages

will benefit from continuing to read, write and complete some math tasks over the summer. There are many ways to practice these skills on a daily basis and the following is a list of suggestions: Practice reading time on an analog clock (a clock with hands and a face), look up the weather forecast and read it aloud daily, have your child read the temperature and calculate changes throughout the day, write out the family grocery list, and write out the daily list of chores. When there are errands to be completed: have your child write down the list of tasks then have them help determine the order in which to complete them, this helps them prioritize and organize their time. Write captions to go with photos on a phone. Remind your child to access free audiobooks- they know how to use the free links through school. Reading texts counts as reading so pack your texts with longer statements. Kids love to read texts. Subscribe to the local newspaper where the student may be more motivated to read about familiar people/events. Participate in the summer reading program at the local library. This semester Ag Project students are showcasing their manufacturing skills through building carts to hold basketballs. These carts will be

completed by the end of the year and will be used in the gym by students. Students were responsible for blueprint drawing, constructing a bill of materials and implementing a plan of action with the cart project. In Intro to Ag students have been focusing on plant and soil science. Currently, students are setting up hydroponic units to monitor plant growth in soilless conditions and will harvest lettuce, tomatoes and peppers. Farm Business Management students have been able to connect current conditions in the ag industry to those of the 1980's farm crisis. It has been fun watching students learn about their own family's agriculture background through our

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activities! Horticulture students are preparing for the greenhouse sale which will take place May 5th and 6th during Edgewood's Mother's Day Weekend Events. These students have also been helping prepare the baseball field for this year's games by laying sod. This quarter, 8th grade students are enjoying exploratory ag through hands-on activities that help connect their everyday lives to agriculture. Don't wait until the end of summer and have to scramble to get them in. Please also see below for any other requirements according to what grade your students will be entering in next school year.

Iowa State Requirements to be aware of

Preschool- Physical, Immunizations
Kindergarten-Vision screening, Dental screening, Physical, Immunizations
3rd Grade-Vision screening
7th Grade- Tdap (vaccine) and 1st Meningitis vaccine
9th Grade-Dental screening
12th Grade-2nd Meningitis vaccine

Please keep in mind, it is best for your student to have yearly physical exams and dental check-ups, but those listed above are required by the state. All students are required to have up to date immunizations every year, but if it's listed above, there is a new requirement for that year. Please contact me with any questions.

<u>News from Superintendent Busch</u> To Families with Students with Individualized Education Programs (IEP)

ACHIEVE

You are an important part of your student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) team. You are receiving this letter as notification of upcoming and exciting changes to the system in which your student's IEP is written.

ACHIEVE is the new system in which IEPs will be written. This new system was designed with the intent to:

- Support IEP teams as they design a program for each individual student
- Increase opportunities for collaboration and communication between IEP team members
- Have one system to house individualized family plans for children birth to 21 with disabilities

Our District will begin transitioning to ACHIEVE in May 2022. Things to know as we transition to this new system:

- Your student's special education services and procedural safeguards under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) will remain the same within the new ACHIEVE system.
- Your student's next IEP paperwork will look different when it is written within the new ACHIEVE system.
- The actual transition to ACHIEVE for your student's IEP will depend on when the next IEP meeting will be renewed which may not occur until later this school year.
- Information and training opportunities will be shared with you in the future regarding parent access to the ACHIEVE system.

More information will be available as we transition to the new ACHIEVE system.
