#### **Information Sheet**

<u>Directions</u>: Registration is to be completed by students with staff and parent input.

An important duty and responsibility of each student and his/her parents is to make course choices for their educational careers. Certain courses are required to meet graduation requirements as established by Iowa code and by the Edgewood-Colesburg Board of Education.

This student registration booklet contains information about graduation requirements and course offering descriptions. Specific course offerings may vary from year to year depending on (1) staff availability and (2) students' registration wishes.

The registration form, complete with student and parent signatures, is to be returned to the high school office. The registration will remain in force unless it is approved for change by the building principal.

#### **Senior Year Plus Programs**

Students interested in earning college credit while in high school should contact the school counselor for information and enrollment procedures.

The Postsecondary Enrollment Option Act (Chapter 261 C, Iowa Code) was enacted in 1987 to promote rigorous academic pursuits and to provide a wider variety of options to high school students by enabling eleventh and twelfth grade students to enroll part time in nonsectarian courses in eligible postsecondary institutions of higher learning in Iowa.

Iowa high school students can enroll in college coursework through a variety of ways. **Regardless of how a student is earning the credit (PSEO, PICC, AP, Concurrent) students will receive high school credit and college credit.** The credit received will appear on a student's high school transcript and college transcript, and will be figured into the student's GPA.

### xPostsecondary Enrollment Options Program

I. Student Eligibility

- A. Junior and senior students who are enrolled in high school.
- B. Student must be proficient on Iowa Assessments in Reading, Math and Science
- C. Students are responsible for their own transportation, if applicable, and any equipment required for the course, i.e., tools, computers, calculators, etc.

#### II. nCourse Requirements

- A. Students may be required to meet entrance requirements. Requirements may include prerequisite courses, ACT scores, or minimum grade point.
- B. Students must take the course(s) for credit. They cannot audit a course. (Take for high school credit but not college credit.)
- C. Students may not enroll in a course if a comparable course is offered at their high school.
- D. Course must be nonsectarian.

#### III. Eligible Postsecondary Schools

- A. See the counselor for a list of eligible schools.
- B. Not all courses offered by these institutions are eligible for participation.

#### IV. Application Procedures

- A. Students must inform the Ed-Co administration of their intent to participate.
- B. See the principal or the counselor for details on applying.

#### **Online AP Courses**

If interested in on-line AP courses, see the counselor for more information. These courses are available at no cost to the student.

#### **Concurrent Enrollment**

Courses delivered through a contractual agreement between a school district and a college where the district is eligible for supplementary weighting through the school foundation formula.

It requires the student to distinguish which care the baby needs at different times. The teacher is able to check the doll's computer for abuse or neglect events. (Overnight care required.) Students will arrange a date that works for them to take the child from after school until the start of school the next day.
