The high school students taking Investigative Writing have been hard at work this semester! This class is an English elective that focuses on writing

and journalism. Our first unit centered around a podcast that tells a fictional story from an investigative journalist's point of view. As we followed the main character's investigation, students in this class were able to think like a journalist by asking questions, analyzing the characters and events, and creating theories. The podcast unit brought us right into our first writing project. Students created a four-series news report that started with a true or fictional scenario and included research, questions, and analysis. After experiencing the process of an investigative reporter through the podcast unit, the students enjoyed the opportunity to become an investigative journalist and create their own news reports.

The high school students taking Enjoying Nonfiction have been doing a great job with their independent reading projects. Each student has selected books for their independent reading time with topics including mystery, true crime, history, health, and much more. It's been wonderful to see the variety in books the students are choosing to read! The students just finished presenting their second reading project and we are beginning our third project. As a whole class, we recently finished reading *The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind*. The students spent time reflecting on, analyzing, and discussing each chapter and the book as a whole. The freshmen are finishing research papers. This is a new unit that was added this year to give students more experience researching, citing sources, and constructing an essay. Students could choose any

topic to write an informative research paper over and picked topics such as video games, farming, welding, and many more. Because they chose topics of interest to them, students have been very engaged and I have been impressed with all of their hard work.



News From Ms. Wall

It feels like just yesterday we were starting the school year and now here we are making our way towards the end. I have loved getting to know the students

more throughout the course of this school year and seeing all the wonderful things they have accomplished! Let's start with 10th grade English. The 10th graders have been working on narrative writing skills. We did some practice on a historical fiction piece about the Titanic and had students think about perspective as they wrote as though they were someone from the ship. They then have moved onto mythology and looking at myths from all over the world and different cultures. We discussed the purpose of myths and some of the key characteristics so that they could create their own. We are wrapping up the creation of our myths and then will move onto poetry. The students in both English 10 and 11 have already been doing some March Madness with poetry to get some exposure to figurative language and different types of poetry.

English 11 has been working on reading The Great Gatsby. The students have really taken to the book! We have been working on a variety of things such as building background knowledge and vocabulary from the 1920's, looking for themes such as the American Dream, and will be writing an analysis about the novel. The students have participated in a variety of discussions and I have loved hearing their theories and unique takes on the ideas brought up in the story. They are so invested in it and I love it! Once we finish up the novel we will be writing an analysis of how the American Dream is represented in the novel and working on connections to their own lives and if they feel the American Dream is alive and well today or if perhaps it isn't or maybe it just looks differently than it did in the past. I look forward to the student's thoughts and reading their papers.

Speech is the other class I teach and we are currently in a new semester so I have 2 sections of speech. We have already finished 2 speeches, a demonstrative speech and a persuasive speech. The demonstrative speeches were interesting to watch because many of

the things students demonstrated were new for me as well! It was so much fun to learn from students how to do things like trapping beaver, operating a grain cart, how to ride a dirt bike, and so much more. The persuasive speeches asked students to pick a controversial topic and work on researching how they could support their thoughts about the topic. Students then were introduced to the idea that they may need to find out what the other side is saying about their topic and that helped guide many of them if they struggled with research. The speech we are currently on is a sales pitch speech. Students are working on creating a product or service that they identify as a need either in their lives or in the world. They are developing "prototypes" of these products by designing images or models. Students also must think of how to make their products stand out to a customer and will present a sales pitch to each other and myself later this month. Once we finish this speech we will move onto job interview skill speeches.

News From Mrs. McCool

I continue to read the book Onward: Cultivating Emotional Resilience in Educators, whose chapters are based on the calendar months, with habits and

accompanying dispositions that result in a calendar of learning, along with a resilience manifesto. As I mentioned previously, I'm still not sure if someone at AEA, from whom I won this book, was feeling psychic or what, but this book amazes me at how well the chapters compliment my life.

January's habit Cultivate Compassion and disposition Perspective focused on compassion moving us to action to relieve others (and our own) suffering, while perspective allows us the empathy to recognize suffering and respond to it. Compassion makes us more resilient by making us happier and healthier, priming our minds for collaboration, making difficult relationships easier, and strengthening communities. Self-compassion is practiced by recognizing and naming painful emotions from difficult circumstances and our own inner critic, recognizing that we are not alone in our imperfections, and extending kindness to ourselves as we make mistakes, fail, and suffer.

Suggestions were given for dealing with critical feedback and difficult people, along with tips for avoiding compassion fatigue, forgiving yourself and others, and dealing with envy. As I read this chapter, I was reminded of current teaching of the Zones of Regulation, which lead me to seek out additional readings about perspective taking for students who struggle with social learning. I was mindful of the youngest student, who acts immature, and gave him grace. I thought of an uncooperative student and played games along with him, making it a win for both of us, as he completed needed tasks, and I found a means of positive reinforcement.

February's habit Be a Learner and disposition Curiosity introduced me to two useful frameworks for learning about learning, the Conscious Competence Ladder (with a growth mindset) and Mind the Gap. The bottom rung of the ladder, Unconscious Incompetence, is simply not knowing we don't know. The second rung, Conscious Incompetence, is knowing we don't know and the spot when we're most likely to give up trying to learn. The third rung, Conscious Competence, is when we have learned the skills but require regular practice to increase automaticity and move to the final rung of Unconscious Competence, in which we can perform without effort and deepen our own understanding by teaching, with confidence, the skills we have acquired to others. Much of my time is spent striving for Conscious Competence, teaching students and reviewing learning to convince the kids they've got it. Mind the Gap recognizes gaps in cultural competence, emotional intelligence, capacity, will, skill, and knowledge in a hierarchy, though the gaps are interconnected. I think one of the true bright spots to come from the pandemic has been the emphasis placed on social/emotional intelligence. While skill and knowledge gaps are traditionally a need for educational learning, the foundations of cultural competence and emotional intelligence are currently just as important. Suggested time management strategies for educators included confront the planning fallacy, chunk it, make to-do lists, obey the calendar, use focusing mechanisms, and stop multitasking, while suggested energy management strategies included pause and renew, get the hardest stuff done first, enlist company, and celebrate small wins. Curiosity benefits us by accessing more of our brain for problem solving, reducing our fears, making us feel good, and helping us learn better and retain information. Curiosity is what keeps me learning, as I

continuously strive to improve my best practice. While the students truly enjoy giving me homework (correcting papers), they do not realize I enjoy giving myself homework just as much, as I learn more. Many times a day, I Google words or pictures on my computer to help answer questions and spark curiosity for students to learn more about unfamiliar topics. Hopefully, the more we learn, the more we want to learn, the more curious we become, and the more learning becomes a continual, constant habit.

March's habit Play and Create and disposition Courage detailed play's attributes of apparent purposelessness, voluntary, inherent attraction, freedom from time, diminished consciousness of self, improvisational potential, and continuation desire, while play's benefits are to relieve stress, improve relationships, improve brain function, keep us feeling young and energetic, and stimulate the mind and boost creativity. It is only with courage that we can play and be creative. It's the creativity required for teaching special education that I enjoy most, even if it often finds me awake at 2:00 a.m. trying to figure out a way to help a particular student. To honor this month's habit, I found the courage to try making scones – raspberry white chocolate and blueberry lemon, so far. While I thought they might be beyond my baking expertise. I've enjoyed the challenge and found them surprisingly easier to make than I had imagined. Thankfully, my family has had the courage to eat them! Baking has always been relaxing for me, so it is an easy way for me to play. I have also given different classes a little time to draw, a frequently requested activity. Attitudes are better and smiles bigger, even if it's just a doodle in a margin while waiting for another student to finish writing a sentence. Others have relished in a few minutes of playing a game. I hope to continue to provide additional opportunities for student to play during our important work of learning as they also acquire resilience.

Library News from Mrs. Mever

One of the most important things to do for your children over the summer is to keep them reading. Research shows that most children experience a "summer

slide" over the summer. Reading is like any other skill, you need to practice it to improve. Here is a great article giving parents tips to prevent that "summer slide" in reading.

Three Ways to Prevent Summer Slide

Many children, especially struggling readers, forget some of what they've learned or slip out of practice during the summer months. Try these strategies to help your reader improve her reading during the summer and beyond:

- 1 Six books to summer success: Research shows that reading just six books during the summer may keep a struggling reader from regressing. When choosing the six, be sure that they are just right not too hard and not too easy. Take advantage of your local library. Ask for help selecting books that match your child's age, interests, and abilities. Libraries often run summer reading programs that motivate kids to read, so find out what's available in your area. Also check our book lists for recommendations.
- 2 **Read something every day:** Encourage your child to take advantage of every **opportunity** to read. Find them throughout the day:
- Morning: The newspaper even if it is just the comics or today's weather.
- Daytime: Schedules, TV guides, magazines, online resources, etc. For example, if your daughter likes the food channel, help her look for a recipe on the network's Web site then cook it together for more reading practice.
 - Evening: End the day by having your child read to you from the book he is currently reading (one of the six books, above). Have him rehearse a paragraph, page, or chapter before reading to you. Rereading will help him be more fluent able to read at an appropriate speed, correctly, and with nice expression.
- 3 **Keep reading aloud:** Reading aloud benefits all children and teens, especially those who struggle. One benefit is that you can read

books your child can't, so she will build listening comprehension skills with grade-level and above books. This will increase her knowledge and expand her experience with text, so that she will do better when she reads on her own.

It's hard to keep up a reading routine in a season packed with distractions and diversions. These suggestions will fit into a busy schedule and make reading fun!
