Reminder: Edgewood Shuttle information

People dropping off and picking up students are encouraged not to park on the south side of Highway 3 or in the Woods Edge golf course parking lot. Also there is no parking adjacent to the bus loading zone along and south of the bus garage. This will greatly improve safety by students not walking across the highway or between the buses.

There is also no parking in front the District office because it is now part of the loading zone. Where there are yellow diagonal lines this areas is for "Buses Only". No foot traffic or other vehicle traffic is allowed. In the mornings please drop off students at the north end of the loading zone (by the District office) so the students can walk the sidewalk along the east side of the buses and have direct access to the entrance doors

For picking up students in the afternoon, please park north of the school building in the school parking lot (again not south of Highway 3). One more change is the parking lot has been converted to "ONE WAY TRAFFIC FLOW" at all times. Traffic flow will be from south to north. Enter off Highway 3 and exit by the swimming pool.

Morning shuttles leave at 7:55. Please have your students dropped off a few minutes prior to that time.

News from Ms. Kintzle

The freshmen recently finished reading *The Tragedy of Romeo and Juliet.* Next, we will begin an essay writing unit. I am excited for this unit, not only because I

love to write, but also because the freshmen and I are going to pilot a new writing program. We will be using a program called Write to Learn. Now, students will get feedback not only from me, but also from the program. I think this program will give students more opportunities to write and additional feedback and thus push them to be better writers.

Individual Reading students have been doing just that, reading. Once again, there are two sections of this course because it is so popular. I am excited to see so many kids choosing to read. These students will soon begin an activity recommending books to junior high students as a way to encourage reading.

Eighth graders will only have my class until the end of first semester. Then, they will not have me again until English 9. Until then, they will continue working on making inferences and supporting those with evidence.

Seventh graders have been working on making connections and summarizing. These are skills we will continue to work on throughout the year in addition to others. Once we start second semester, we will largely focus on reading and enjoying nonfiction books.



News from Ms. Solsma

In 7th grade language arts, the students are currently working in literature circles. The groups are about three to four students each, and each group

member has a specific job that they must complete for the story. Some of the jobs in include an Illustrator (creates a picture for the story), a Word Wizard (looks up unknown words), or a Connecter (writes down connections that they or their group members have to the story). The students are working very well together, and they are close to finishing all of their short stories!

The 8th grade language arts students are working on researching why people use figurative language. They were able to partner up and do some online research for this assignment. The 8th graders came up with some great reasons why people use figures of speech. They are also currently reading *The Outsiders*, and we are discussing the figurative language that is found within the novel. The students love this book!

In Speech class, the students are just starting their demonstration speeches. The students are trying to decide what they are going to demonstrate to their classmates. They will begin writing, practicing, and bringing in materials for their speech soon. This is usually a favorite speech for many of my students. They enjoy showing their classmates something that is a talent of theirs!

In Investigative Writing, the students are finishing up their Editorials. The students were able to choose a popular topic in today's world to discuss their opinion about it. Their opinion might be to criticize, compliment, or persuade someone about their topic. The students were very passionate about their topics they chose, and the editorials have been coming along nicely!

There has always been a saying that we learn as we teach, and in my last few years of teaching, this is my strongest philosophy. In special education, I have

learned that student motivation is key for success. Unfortunately, it is one thing I have found in special education that is lacking. The enthusiasm that comes with learning is something that is taught. I have learned that if I am motivated in my teaching, my students are more motivated to learn, and academic achievement is boosted! Here are some ways to help:

1. **Fill your child's world with reading.** Take turns reading with your child, or establish a family reading time when everyone reads her own book. Demonstrate how important reading is to you by filling your home with printed materials: novels,

newspapers, even posters and placemats with words on them.

- 2. **Point out the new things** *you* **learn with enthusiasm.** Discuss the different ways you find new information, whether you're looking for gardening tips on the Internet or taking a night class in American literature.
- 3. **Ask about what he's learning in school, not about his grades or test scores.** Have him teach you what he learned in school today putting the lesson into his own words will help him retain what he learned.
- 4. Help your child organize her school papers and assignments so she feels in control of her work. If her task seems too daunting, she'll spend more time worrying than learning. Check in with her regularly to make sure she's not feeling overloaded.
- 5. **Celebrate achievements, no matter how small.** Completing a book report calls for a special treat; finishing a book allows your child an hour of video games. You'll offer **positive**

reinforcement that will inspire him to keep learning and challenging himself.

6. **Focus on strengths, encouraging developing talents.** Even if she didn't ace her math test, she may have written a good poem in English class. In addition to a workbook for math practice, give her a writing journal.

During this holiday season and in your future teachings, I encourage you to renew the joy in discovery. Learning CAN be fun!




News from Mrs. Schulte

Wow! We have been having a lot of fun in science class so far this year! Our first unit of study was all about matter. Students worked through may

experiments demonstrating chemical and physical changes and their knowledge of the properties of

matter. They came up with their own experiments (school approved©) to demonstrate chemical changes to their peers. After the study of matter, 6th graders moved into and are currently studying living things, cells,



determine what, if any, living things were in their

containers, but too small to observe with the naked eye. Students also have gone around the school to take samples of bacteria that can be found on the things that we touch. They have been growing the bacteria in petri dishes and observing the results that can be seen without the aide of the microscopes and even closer, under the microscopes. They know how to use the microscopes and prepare wet and dry mount slides on their own.

In 5th grade science, students are learning about the energy that animals need to live and where that energy originated from. Ask them... they know[©] We are working on a research



project with Mrs. Meyer to dive deeper into ecosystems and what would happen if just one living thing were to be eliminated from the food web. In 5th grade, we have also been conducting fair tests learning about controlled and experimental variable in our experiments. They grew grass in two different containers one in which had all of the variables controlled and the other had an experimental variable of their choice.

First grade has been very busy! In reading, we are practicing Visualizing and



Asking Questions before, during, and after we read a story. It was fun to use our schema as we visualized things that we do for Thanksgiving. We also studied what a pilgrim boy and a pilgrim girl had for their jobs in the olden days.

Science is interesting as we learned about light and sound. Using flashlights to experience opaque, translucent, and transparent was one of our experiments. We also studied the seasons and how those seasons happen. We know that the Earth rotates and revolves.

We have learned nouns, verbs, and adjectives in Language. Can you find one of each in this sentence: My colorful turkey ran from the hunter! We are working on using some of these language skills as we write a story. Speaking of writing...we are learning how to put our thoughts on paper using capital letters, spaces, and punctuation.

From Superintendent Rob Busch Use of Dogs to Search School Property

The Board recognizes that learning can

best occur in a safe and secure educational environment. In order to promote such an environment, the Board supports reasonable procedures that ensure that the District's schools and activities are free of tobacco products, alcohol and other illegal or harmful drugs or substances/devices. The Superintendent of Schools may authorize, as part of an overall effort to maintain safe schools, the periodic use of narcotic detection dogs to alert staff to the presence of substances prohibited by law or Board policy.

All school property such as lockers, classrooms, parking areas and storage areas may be searched.

- Dogs shall not be used in rooms occupied by persons except for demonstration purposes with the handler present.
- When used for demonstration purposes, the dog may not sniff the person or any individual.
- The dogs may sniff the air around lockers, desks, or vehicles on District property or at District-sponsored events as long as they are not allowed to sniff within close proximity of any student's person.
- Individual(s) shall not be subjected to a search by dogs. To avoid the potential of allergic reactions, dogs shall be kept away from the students.

Actual times or dates of planned searches need not be released in advance. Only the dog's official handler will determine what constitutes an alert by the dog. If a dog alerts on a locker and a search is subsequently conducted by school officials, the search will be conducted in the presence of the student(s) whose locker(s) is/are being searched or, in the absence of the student(s), the search shall be conducted in the presence of at least one other person. If a dog alerts on a locked vehicle, the student

who brought it onto District property shall be asked to unlock it for a search conducted per procedure outlined in Board of Education Policy. An effort shall be made to protect the student's privacy to the greatest degree possible.

Law enforcement agencies will be contacted to investigate, handle and confiscate any illegal substances or materials found during the school's search and students with such substances or materials may be subject to criminal prosecution in addition to any school disciplinary action.

These searches will hopefully **NOT** turn up tobacco products, alcohol and other illegal or harmful drugs or substances/devices. The Board and staff want the best learning environment possible.


