News from Mrs. Megan Bonert



Hello Ed-Co Elementary Families! Have you ever heard the words "phonemic awareness?" This is one of those fun teacher words that sounds very

complicated and confusing but is actually very simple. It may be simple, but it can have a HUGE impact on your child's success with reading! Would you like to know the best part about this? It requires NOTHING! No materials! No books! You can do it anywhere, anytime, it is a super fun way to "play" with words with your child, and it will help them so much with being a successful reader! You can do this while you are cooking supper, driving in the car, waiting at a restaurant, or at an older siblings sporting event. You can do it anywhere!

So, how do you practice this phonemic awareness skill? I thought you would never ask! Here are some examples:

Ask your child what the beginning sound in a word is. Ex: What is the beginning sound in the word pig?

- Ask your child what the last sound in a word is. Ex: What is the last sound in the word map?
- Ask your child to tell you the sounds in a word. Ex: Tell me the sounds you hear in the word sit. (They will say the sound of each letter in the word: s-i-t.
- You say all the sounds in a word and have your child blend the sounds together and tell you the word. Ex: You say the sounds in the word sip: s-i-p. Your child will blend those together and say the whole word.
- Ask your child to change the beginning sound in a word. Ex: Say the word pan. Change the /p/ to /r/ (say the sounds, not the letters). What's the new word? (ran)
- Ask your child to change the last sound in a word. Ex: Say the word pen. Change the /n/ to /t/ (say the sounds, not the letters). What's the new word? (pet)
- Ask your child to change the middle sound in a word. Ex: Say the word cap. Change the /a/ to /u/ (say the sounds, not the letters). What's the new word? (cup)

This is the just the beginning of phonemic awareness but practicing this "playing with words" skill with your child can have a big impact and help them grow as a reader so much! We hope you will try this with your kiddos and make it a fun game to play with them while helping them become awesome readers!



<u>News from Mrs. Schulte</u> Fifth & Sixth Grade Science

Matter is everything and the fifth graders have been studying almost everything about matter! They have learned that

matter has properties, and matter changes during physical and chemical changes. Some of the highlights of their study of matter have been doing a lot of hands-on work to explore the properties of matter including mass, volume, conductivity, and solubility and mystery bags trying to figure out what an object is based on its properties. Clues like bubbling, producing a gas, turning hot or cold, changing color, and producing a new substance have been evidence to see if a chemical change has happened to matter as students researched safe chemical changes and performed a chemical change demonstration with a partner for the class. Students had fun blowing up a sandwich bag with the gas made from combining vinegar and baking soda. Another favorite way students learned about matter was to make slime and witness how the properties of the substances before and after that chemical change are so different and to test the properties (elasticity, state of matter – is it a solid or a liquid and why?- density, solubility) of their completed product. An important concept of matter is how it is conserved in chemical and physical changes. We use songs about atoms and matter to make the concepts fun. Matter is everything and we have been doing everything we can to make the learning of matter real, memorable, and applicable to our lives!

6th grade has been studying Properties and Conservation of Matter as well. They have collaborated on many chemical/physical change investigations including blowing up a balloon with the chemical reaction between vinegar and baking soda, learning how to use triple beam balances to understand conservation of matter after a chemical reaction occurs, etc. Most recently, 6th graders learned about thermal energy transfer and built thermal protection devices to try to keep an ice cube form melting overnight. One group accomplished the task successfully and each one of them learned about why their device did not work out like they hoped.



News from Mr. Heying Hello Everyone!

It feels like the school year has already been flying by! Guidance lessons have

been going fantastic with all of our wonderful students and we are now almost to the point we are moving on to new materials. So far our classes have been learning about creating new pathways in the brain, making practice plans to help better at the things students are doing inside and outside of the school and for my older students we are working on creating specific goals in their everyday lives. Also a reminder that the after school program is in full swing and I can't thank all of our wonderful staff that is helping out with it! We are holding it on Tuesday nights where our students who qualify receive extra help on their schooling and to improve overall classroom performance!



<u>3rd Grade News from Mrs.</u> <u>Kim Bonert & Mrs. Brady</u> We have been working very

hard in third grade.



We got to go on our first field trip of the year in November. We went to Dubuque and saw the symphony. The students learned about the different types of instruments which are brass, string, woodwinds, and percussion. The students enjoyed learning about the different instruments from Ms. Flint.

In Reading, we have been working on sequences of events. This pairs well with what we are learning in writing. In Writing, we are working on a unit on writing procedural text. Some of the features of this genre are including the title, and introduction, supplies needed, ordered steps, a conclusion, and illustrations. Students have been reading recipes on how to make different foods. Students will choose an area that they are an expert on and they will write steps on how to do it. They will share about theirs with their class.

In Math, we are working learning about multiplication. We have learned a couple tricks and strategies to help us. Some of these strategies are skip counting, making arrays, repeated addition, making equal groups, and using a number line to make jumps. We have also learned more about the associative property of multiplication and the distributive property of multiplication. By the end of this chapter, it would be great if the students would have their multiplication facts memorized!

In Social Studies, we have been learning about Native Americans. We have compared the similarities and differences of the tribes who lived in different regions of the country. We are going to learn about cultures around the world for the month of December. We will be learning about countries such as France, Mexico, India, Canada, and the traditions of different parts of the United States also.

We are having a great year in third grade!
