Drop off/Pick up Reminder

People dropping off and picking up students are not to park on the south side of Highway 3 or in the Woods Edge golf course parking lot. Also there is no parking adjacent to the bus loading zone along and south of the bus garage. This will greatly improve safety by students not walking across the highway or between the buses.

There is also no parking in front the District office because it is now part of the loading zone. Where there are yellow diagonal lines this areas is for "Buses Only". No foot traffic or other vehicle traffic is allowed. In the mornings please drop off students at the north end of the loading zone (by the District office) so the students can walk the sidewalk along the east side of the buses and have direct access to the entrance doors. On the first day of school, look of the balloons that will mark the new drop off area by the district office.

For picking up students in the afternoon, please park north of the school building in the school parking lot (again not south of Highway 3). One more change is the parking lot has been converted to "ONE WAY TRAFFICE FLOW" at all times. Traffic flow will be from south to north. Enter off Highway 3 and exit by the swimming pool.

Morning shuttles leave at 7:55. Please have your students dropped off a few minutes prior to that time.

Thanks you to the staff, students and district parents for your help in implementing these changes for the safety of our children.

News from Ms. Anderson

The goal in Ed-Co's secondary special education classroom is to close academic and social/emotional/behavioral gaps between students with disabilities and

their peers. By using the high-leverage practices of collaboration, assessment,

social/emotional/behavioral strategies and instruction we are trying to effectively educate students with disabilities. Professional collaboration occurs regularly between the general education and special education teachers to target student learning. Families also share a role in working together with the special education teacher to support learning. Multiple assessments broaden the understanding of a student's strengths and needs. The assessments allow teachers to analyze instructional practices and make necessary adjustments that improve student outcomes. Along with teaching social behaviors our classrooms try to establish respectful, consistent, and organized learning environments. Students receive positive and constructive feedback to steer their learning and behavior. At the secondary level, students are taught to self-advocate for their needs by learning to improve their communications skills with teachers. The students have been instructed in how to email inquiries to their teachers and respectfully ask for clarification. Another aspect of social/emotional/behavioral skills is teaching students to develop a growth mindset and understanding of resilience.

The evidence-based high-leverage practices guide the specially designed instruction (SDI) provided at school. SDI most often occurs in the special education setting but can be delivered in any classroom. It provides intensive, explicit instruction designed for specific learning goals, both short and long term. The strategies support learning for students with disabilities as it encourages independence while attempting to close the gap in skills. Student motivation is a huge factor in achieving growth. Our classrooms continually try to engage students in their learning using frequent feedback and opportunities for active learning.



Edgewood-Colesburg Agriculture Department News- Mr. Wadsworth

This year has slowed down our FFA activities but not our classroom items. FFA was still able to get a few things in such as district soils and district livestock

judging. Members also held award ceremonies and freshman members attended green hand fire up. Fruit sales were also held as our annual fundraiser.

In the classroom our animal science class was able to attend Honey creek dairy and see robotic milking machines and feeding systems. Our Ag Mechanics class was able to have guest



speakers come in and teach us. We had guests from Masonry institute of Iowa and NICC construction come and teach our class. They also worked on building a 6ft by 8ft garden shed. Welding class partnered with our business department and has been in production stages for products for the



business classes to market and sell. Our landscaping class was able to complete a couple of landscape projects around the school facilities before it got cold out. The Ag Drawing class has been designing buildings and farms using CAD tools and even made farms utilizing Mine craft.

The 8th grade FCS students were busy in the kitchen labs with a sugar cookie project the last full week of school before Christmas break. Typically, the class makes and

decorates Christmas cookies as one of our labs just before the holidays. The students came up with an idea to make sugar cookie making kits for each of them to take home and enjoy as an activity with their



family. Though it is unsure how many kits were eaten



before they actually made it home. Regardless, the students learned a lot of kitchen skills. They learned how to measure powdered sugar using a sifter, how to soften butter using power levels in the microwave, how to cream butter and sugar, and the benefit of using a pastry cloth, and rolling pin cover while rolling out cookie dough. Lastly, they learned that a convection oven has many benefits when baking cookies; many trays can be baked at once with even cooking, more efficient cooking time, and that the faster baking time leaves the cookies soft on the inside yet crunchy around the edges. Believe me when I say it is a whirlwind of crazy to complete a lab with 20 eighth grade students in 41 minutes but the students prepared well, had fun and only a few were just a minute or two late for their next period class.

Edgewood-Colesburg Community School Emergency School Closure Process

As the winter weather season is now in full swing, **Edgewood-Colesburg Community Schools will** continue to evaluate the process it uses to decide when to close schools due to bad weather and how to best alert parents and students about the closure. The district is aware of the implications of emergency school closures. We realize when schools shut down parents must make alternative plans, bus and food services must be altered, class and test schedules must change, and events must be canceled. We also feel strongly that our students' education can best be served when they are in class; however, safety is our number one priority. We will always do what is best to safeguard the well-being of our students and staff, but sometimes closing schools is not the obvious choice. The school district covers almost the width of an entire county. There have been times when the weather has changed, road conditions have deteriorated, or a storm has stalled over the area that a last minute decision has been made to close. These late decisions are made to protect our students and staff. There are many factors that are considered. The images of our bus drivers on slippery roads, of young children standing at frozen bus stops, and teens, or their parents, driving in hazardous conditions is always present when the decision is made to close schools. Once the decision is made, the **Edgewood-Colesburg Community Schools must** disseminate the message quickly to the media, staff, and parents.

*Some stations get the information on faster than others. The best advice is to listen to more than one so our information is not overlooked.

Since parents are the primary protectors, they will need to decide what is best for their children regardless of any decision by the school district. The option to keep children home when weather conditions are extreme is always at the parents' discretion and the school understands and respects the decision. Parents can contact the school and arrange for an excused student absence. All families should make advanced arrangement for their children in case of school closures and for the rare situation when it is necessary to close school because of a power failure or another circumstance. Children should know where to go if a parent will not be home and how to contact parents and guardians. Make sure your parent contact information, including work telephone numbers, are kept up-to-date with the school.

During cold weather you should always make sure your child is dressed appropriately. Bulky coats and boots can be stored in classrooms, or other areas designated by the principal in addition to student lockers so don't be afraid to bundle them up. Working together we can ensure the safety of the Edgewood-Colesburg Community Schools during the hazardous weather season.
