### News from Mr. Hamann

As we settle into the second semester, students are eagerly working on their learning targets in class. Much like previous years, the students work hard

at practicing with these topics, doing homework and formative assessments, before their progress is tested on a summative assessment. For those of you who have not yet asked their math student about topics currently being studied, here is a glimpse into what each of my 2<sup>nd</sup> semester classes is tackling.

The students in **Algebra 2** just finished up a big chapter all about quadratics and will now be starting to explore polynomial functions. They will be practicing some advanced solving techniques and learning about the Fundamental Theorem of Algebra.

Algebra III students have been diving into statistical measures and finding various probabilities and will soon be moving on to topics in Trigonometry. This class tends to be very intensive for students as the targets we lay out for them are advanced, requiring a deeper level of thinking, but both sections of this class seem up for the challenge.

This semester has just two upper-level math offerings that are challenging our juniors and seniors. The **Statistics** class is exploring ways to display various data and methods for effectively collecting that data. This course contains topics that many students bound for a post-secondary institution will likely face. **Calculus** is a semester long class emphasizing topics relating to limits, derivatives, and integrals. Calculus is a logical choice for students wanting to pursue a post-secondary education in the hard sciences and engineering fields.

All of my classes are also working hard on projects as we prepare for **Pi Day** coming up in March. For

anyone familiar with the never-ending, transcendental number pi, my memorization record for someone reciting digits of pi currently stands at 260 digits. Please ask your student what type of project they are preparing for our in-class celebration.



### News from Mrs. Wille 10th grade Chemistry

This group has just begun learning about the bonding of molecules and what it means to be polar. We will be discussing

in detail the characteristics of polar substances and how those properties can be used to separate mixtures.

### 7th grade life science

The 7th graders have been learning about viruses, why they are considered nonliving, and why the doctor doesn't give you antibiotics to help when you have a virus. Our study of viruses has coincided with the outbreak of the Coronavirus so we have been following the news closely. Along with viruses, we are also learning about bacteria and how they often get a bad wrap but have tons of positive impacts on society.

### 9th grade physics

Physics students are currently learning about states of matter and density. Up next - THE GREAT BOAT FLOAT of 2020 as we study the density of liquids and buoyancy.

### **Advanced chemistry**

Indicators, pH scales, and antilogs OH MY! My advanced students have been exploring the world of acids and bases. We had some fun with rainbow tubes and we are currently calculating the ion concentration from pH and pOH numbers. We will be jumping into neutralization and titration as we prepare for the 2020 Chemistry Olympics at Loras College.



### News from Mrs. Lange

It's hard to believe that the first half of the year is over, and we are in semester two already. The 7<sup>th</sup> graders, 8<sup>th</sup> graders, and Algebra I students have been

working diligently to advance their knowledge on the topics we have been learning. For the 7th graders those topics include: working with negative numbers, solving equations for the first time, solving inequalities, rates, ratios, and proportions. The 8th graders have been studying how to work with functions, graph linear equations, and solving

systems of equations, all while also advancing on topics they learned last year. In Algebra I, we are repeating some of the curriculum learned in 8th grade, but taking it to the next level. They too are learning about functions, but now know function notation and domain & range. They also revisited linear functions, but learned two new forms of linear equations and direct variation. They are also solving systems of equations, but the equations are more complex. We are hoping to finish the year as strongly as we started it.

The preschoolers are also continuing to learn their letter sounds. We have 5 more single letter sounds to learn. All of the children have made progress with learning sounds. It is exciting to see them use this letter sound knowledge when reading and writing!

### News from Mrs. Anderega

Well, we are more than half way through the school year (finally)! The special education world at the elementary has been busy catching up on progress

monitoring and alternate assessment testing after Christmas break. Because winter testing is over, special education teachers are looking closer at student data to see how much progress they've made and whether changes need to be made or not in an IEP (individual education plan) or if instructional changes need to be made.

For students who have an IEP that participate in Iowa Assessments, special education teachers track their

progress on a graph. Usually, if there are four or more data points at or above the aim line (a line on their graph showing where we want the student to be toward his or her progress), the IEP goal could be changed or the student could be exited from their IEP. If progress monitoring shows the student below the aim line for more than 4 data points, changes need to be made either to their IEP, or in what the special education teacher is instructing.

For students who have an IEP that participate in Iowa's Alternate Assessment, the same procedures take place, except they usually are not exited from their IEP. The special education teacher also has to review alternate assessment data and evidence to decide the level the student is currently at. Depending on the grade level of the student, students on alternate assessment are instructed based off of something called the Iowa Core Essential Elements, which is like the Iowa Core Standards. The Iowa Core Essential Elements are broken down into smaller steps and different levels. These levels help guide a special education teacher in deciding whether or not to move down or up a level in what a student can do.

Needless to say, the teachers and students have all been working very hard all year long. My favorite part of teaching is seeing student growth, and I have seen a lot this year! I look forward to seeing what strides my students have made come spring.



### News from Mrs. Trenkamp

Attendance at school is critical for your child. If your child misses just one day a week of school, he'll have missed more than two and a half years of class time

before he graduates! Even missing one day a month quickly adds up. Frequent absences result in lost learning time in critical subjects like math and reading, as well as class discussions and demonstrations. Even doing extra homework will not make up for the things your child misses when he or she is out of school. So what can you do to make sure your child's attendance is regular?

- **Prep the night before.** Teach your child not to leave for tomorrow what he can finish tonight! That means his backpack is loaded and waiting at the door. The clothes are laid out. The lunch is packed. The less scrambling she/he has to do, the less likely to miss the bus.
- Enforce a sensible bedtime. Your child needs sleep to function, so be sure he gets enough.
  Occasionally staying up late to finish an assignment

isn't a crisis, but it shouldn't become a habit. Also, no TV's or other electronics 1 hour before bedtime and no TV's or electronics in the child's bedroom.

• Stick to a morning routine. Have your child wake up at the same time each day, so there is has enough time to get ready without rushing. "The habits we form from childhood make no small difference, but rather they make all the difference." —Aristotle

## **District News**



Edgewood-Colesburg School District Vote on Revenue Purpose Statement for Expenditure of State Sales Tax for School Infrastructure and Property Tax Relief:

On March 3, Edgewood-Colesburg school patrons will have an opportunity to vote on a new Revenue Purpose Statement to direct the district's spending of state penny sales tax revenues. This vote does not impact your sales taxes.

**History:** There used to be a school local option sales tax, or SILO, which 61.2% of Delaware County voters approved back in 2003 and 73.4% of Clayton County Voters approved in 2007. Eventually, voters in all 99 counties approved this sales tax to upgrade school facilities without increasing property taxes. The SILO was originally intended to last ten years. In 2008, the Legislature changed the SILO local option into a state penny sales tax to benefit the students in all school districts. In the 2019 Session, the Legislature further extended the state penny. The state will continue to collect the penny on retail purchases through Dec. 31, 2050 and will continue to send the proceeds to all lowa school districts.

**Recent Changes:** As part of this change, the state now requires school districts to determine how they plan to spend the sales tax money for the tax extension and communicate those intentions to their patrons. The Edgewood-Colesburg school board has passed a resolution approving the new Revenue Purpose Statement, which states how the district must use the sales tax funds. The voters have a chance to weigh in on that revenue purpose statement at a special school election on March 3. The statement must follow Iowa law and can only use the funds for specific purposes described in law as school infrastructure and property tax relief. The law limits the uses to construction, reconstruction, demolition, repair, purchase of equipment, technology, buses, school safety equipment, and other infrastructure and property tax relief needs defined in the Iowa Code which voters will see stated on the Revenue Purpose Statement and ballot. The Iowa Secretary of State defines the ballot language for the revenue purpose statement and requires it to follow a standardized format.

**Stakeholder input:** Since the Revenue Purpose Statement will direct district expenses for a long

time, through 2050, the statement preserves some flexibility for a future board to operate within the constraints of the law and consider additional projects or equipment purchases that otherwise would take property taxes to fund. In most cases, other school districts have language which lists all legal uses of the state penny revenue and preserves future flexibility similar to the revenue purpose statement that the Edgewood-Colesburg voters will consider on March 3. This is not the only opportunity for the public to weigh in, however. If this school board or any future school board wishes to bond using the sales tax revenues to pay ongoing obligations, or wishes to spend sales tax revenues on athletic facilities not attached to the school, the new law requires the district to conduct a public hearing prior to either of those actions. If the public delivers a petition with signatures equal to 30% of those voting in the last school election, then the school board must either rescind the plan or place that bond issue or athletic facility improvement on the ballot for all voters to weigh in.

SAVE Uses in Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District: During the duration of the local option sales tax, and the state penny sales tax for school infrastructure since 2008, the board has understood student needs for safe, technology-ready facilities designed for student learning. The district has used the funds to update HVAC controls, install new windows, add additional parking, provide one-to-one computers and technology needs, LED lighting, among other improvements. The Board has held work sessions and continue to hold more to acquire public input on things need to be done to keep the Edgewood-Colesburg School facilities in energy-efficient working condition to create the best environment for students.

The Text of the Revenue Purpose Statement as approved by the Edgewood-Colesburg School Board, which will be on the March 3 ballot, follows:

Summary: To adopt a Revenue Purpose Statement specifying the use of revenues the Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District will receive from the State of Iowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund.

In the Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District, the following Revenue Purpose Statement which specifies the use of revenues the Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District will receive from the State of Iowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund shall be adopted.

To provide funds to acquire or install information technology infrastructure (including improving buildings or sites for the purpose of accessing broadband digital telecommunications) and school safety and security infrastructure.

To provide funds to build and furnish a new school building or buildings; to build and furnish addition(s) to school buildings in the District; to remodel, reconstruct, repair, expand, and improve the school buildings in the District; to purchase and improve grounds; for demolition work; to furnish and equip district facilities.

To provide funds for the purchase, lease or lease-purchase of buildings, equipment (including transportation and recreation equipment), or technology and to repair transportation equipment for transporting students as authorized by law, to implement energy conservation measures, sharing or rental of facilities including infrastructure project for the purposes of offering classes under a district-to-community college as authorized in Iowa Code Section 423F.3(3)(c), procuring or acquisition of libraries, or opening roads to schoolhouses or buildings.

To provide funds to purchase land as part of start-up costs for new student construction program or if the sale of the previous student construction was insufficient to purchase land, and to purchase construction materials and supplies for a student-constructed building or shed intended to be retained by and used by the District.

To provide funds to make payments to a municipality or other entity as required under Iowa Code Section 403.19(2).

To provide funds for demolition, cleanup, and other costs if such costs are necessitated by, and incurred within two years of, a disaster. To provide funds to establish and maintain public recreation places and playgrounds;

provide for supervision and instruction for recreational activities; or for community education purposes.

To provide funds for the payment of principal and interest or retirement of general obligation bonds issued school for infrastructure purposes, energy improvement loans, loan agreements authorized by Iowa Code Section 297.36, sales, service and use tax revenue bonds issued under Iowa Code Section 423E.5 or Iowa Code Section 423F.4. To provide funds for property tax relief; and To provide funds for other authorized expenditures and purposes as now or hereafter permitted by law and designated by the Edgewood-Colesburg Community School

It being understood that if this proposition should fail to be approved by the voters, such failure shall not be construed to terminate or restrict authority previously granted by the voters to expend receipts from the Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund.

If approved, this Revenue Purpose Statement shall remain in effect until replaced or amended by the Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District.


