# The nice weather we are having is giving a lot of us spring fever. Our building addition is also giving us a lot of excitement. It's wonderful to see the

changes every day.

In 8<sup>th</sup> grade Algebra, students are working on graphing linear equations. We compared cell phone plans. We looked at a graph for a company that had unlimited data. This was a nice lead to learning about horizontal lines.

In Geometry we are learning trigonometry. This is a new concept for this group of students and it is one of my favorite units to teach. Once we do some practice, students see how easy the concept is. There are also a lot of jobs in our area where people use trigonometry daily.

In Foundations of Math, we are finding the slope of lines. We have learned several ways to find the slope and students are getting comfortable with the method that works best for them. We will be moving on to factoring quadratics in the near future.

### <u>News from Mr. Hamann</u> Mathematical Matters

As we settle into the second semester, students are eagerly working on their

learning targets in class. Much like previous years, the students work hard at practicing with these topics, doing homework and formative assessments, before their progress is tested on a summative assessment. For those of you who have not yet asked their math student about topic currently being studied, here is a glimpse into what each of my 2<sup>nd</sup> semester classes is tackling.

The students in **Algebra 2** just finished up a big chapter all about quadratics and will now be starting to explore polynomial functions. They will be practicing some advanced solving techniques and learning about the Fundamental Theorem of Algebra. **Algebra III** students have been diving into statistical measures and finding various probabilities and will soon be moving on to topics in Trigonometry. This class tends to be very intensive for students as the targets we lay out for them are advanced, requiring a deeper level of thinking, but both sections of this class seem up for the challenge. The **Calculus** class is studying derivatives and will start on applications of derivatives as we progress through 3rd quarter before moving on to integrals in the 4th quarter. In **Principles of Money** we have finished up our unit about budgeting and are now diving into the world of credit and everything that effects it both positively and negatively.

All of my classes are also working hard on projects as we prepare for **Pi Day** coming up in March. For anyone familiar with the never-ending, transcendental number pi, my memorization record for someone reciting digits of pi currently stands at 260 digits. Please ask your student what type of project they are preparing for our in-class celebration.

It may be cold outside, but things are heating up in the gym and the Kluesner facility as **Baseball** pitchers and catchers begin their preseason workouts in preparation for the upcoming summer season. We spend 2-3 mornings during the week as time to work on pitching techniques. ## Special Education News from Mrs. <u>Anderega</u>

There has always been a saying that we learn as we teach, and in my last few years of teaching, this is my strongest philosophy. In special education, I have learned that student motivation is key for success. Unfortunately, it is one thing I have found in special education that is lacking. The enthusiasm that comes with learning is something that is taught. I have learned that if I am motivated in my teaching, my students are more motivated to learn, and academic achievement is boosted! Here are some ways to help:

1. Fill your child's world with reading. Take turns reading with your child, or establish a family reading time when everyone reads her own book. Demonstrate how important reading is to you by filling your home with printed materials: novels, newspapers, even posters and placemats with words on them.

2. Point out the new things you learn with enthusiasm. Discuss the different ways you find new information, whether you're looking for gardening tips on the Internet or taking a night class in American literature.

3. Ask about what he's learning in school, not about his grades or test scores. Have him teach you what he learned in school today — putting the lesson into his own words will help him retain what he learned.

4. Help your child organize her school papers and assignments so she feels in control of her work. If her task seems too daunting, she'll spend more time worrying than learning. Check in with her regularly to make sure she's not feeling overloaded.

5. Celebrate achievements, no matter how small. Completing a book report calls for a special treat; finishing a book allows your child an hour of video games. You'll offer positive reinforcement that will inspire him to keep learning and challenging himself.

6. Focus on strengths, encouraging developing talents. Even if she didn't ace her math test, she may have written a good poem in English class. In addition to a workbook for math practice, give her a writing journal.

In your future teachings, I encourage you to renew the joy in discovery. Learning CAN be fun!



## News from Mrs. Schulte

In 5<sup>th</sup> grade science news, students have been learning about the four spheres that make up our Earth. The atmosphere,

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geosphere, hydrosphere, and biosphere. Now, they are continuing on even further into the biosphere, learning about Energy from the Sun and the Energy Pyramid, food chains, food webs, and ecosystems and that all energy in our ecosystems was once energy from the Sun. They are researching an animal and its effect on the ecosystem. They need to determine what would happen, if anything, to the rest of the ecosystem if this animal disappeared. They are making a google slide presentation to share with their classmates about their animal, its habitat, what it prays upon (or eats) and what preys upon it, where it fits into the Energy Pyramid, and most importantly, its importance to the ecosystem.

We have also been conducting fair tests learning about controlled and experimental variable in our experiments. They grew grass in two containers one using water to and the other had an experimental variable of their choice, to "water" it with. Some students chose milk, orange juice, sugar water, salt water, sanitizer & water. It's getting a little stinky in the science room!

The fifth graders are participating in the D.A.R.E. Program. D.A.R.E. stands for Drug Abuse Resistance Education. D.A.R.E. is a 10-week program that helps students resist pressures that may influence them to experiment with alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. Students will also be introduced to the D.A.R.E. Decision Making Model that will assist them in problem solving, being a good citizen, and helping to make wise decisions. The D.A.R.E. sessions will take place every week for 45 minutes for the 10 weeks. The Ed-Co School District, in conjunction with the Delaware County Sheriff's Office, is presenting this drug abuse education program. The curriculum was developed by the Los Angeles, California Unified School District's Instructional Specialist and will be presented by a uniformed deputy sheriff, Deputy Jeff Zalaznik.

6<sup>th</sup> grade scientists are studying 6 of our human body systems and how they interact with the other body systems. Students have researched a system of their choice on their own, then grouped up with classmates to put together a class to teach their peers - complete with visuals, models, activities, quizzes, etc. Dr. Hauser from the Edgewood Vet Clinic will come to dissect a piglet with us soon. It is always a great learning experience to study body systems and then get to see and touch actual body parts and systems of the pig. We are also learning about growing lettuce and what to do with it as it grows. Some of us have green thumbs and some of us are still working on getting our plants to grow. (\*)

Fourth Graders are working on finding equivalent fractions and will soon begin adding and subtracting fractions. This will be followed by multiplying fractions. We are exploring cause and effect, as well as learning about the Great Depression. Our students are engaged in experiments about the structures of the human body and its fascinating functions.

In Reading, we have been working hard on Facts vs. Opinion. Students have enjoyed getting to read many

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fun stories in class and on their own. We got to go to Gallaghar Bluedorn to watch "Dot Dot Dot" which is based on <u>The Dot</u> by Peter H. Reynolds. Afterwards, we went to a writing workshop in the Maucker Union on campus. We learned how to write one minute stories. Peter's brother Paul was there and he was impressed with our stories! It was so fun to walk around campus and see what it would be like to go to UNI.

In Writing, we have finished our informative reports. Our goal was to write three paragraphs with five sentences in each paragraph. Each paragraph had an introduction sentence, three details, and a concluding sentence. We have also been working on using written responses across all the subject areas.

In Math, we have been working on fractions. When students come to third grade, they know the names of fractions such as halves, thirds, and fourths for example. Now, we begin working on unit fractions and parts of a whole. We will start comparing fractions and learning about equivalent fractions.

In Social Studies, we have covered immigration, migration, and cultures around the world. Students enjoyed learning about different groups of people and what makes them special. During cultures around the world, students completed many fun activities surrounding winter holiday traditions.

In Science, we have completed our second FOSS kit. This kit involves growing plants and having live crayfish in the room. Students really enjoy all the hands-on activities we get with this unit. The bravest ones even get to hold the crayfish during class!

## <u>News from Mrs. Askeland</u>

It is great that Winter will slowly be turning to Spring soon! The school year is flying by!

Currently in preschool we are doing a Box Study. So, what does this mean? This means that we are using the children's interest in boxes to explore important social studies and science concepts and use skills in literacy, math, technology and the arts. So far, we have used our observational skills to see what we notice about our box collection. We have aligned the boxes from smallest to largest and drawn our observations. We have also done Box Painting with a partner and will be building a box structure and discuss what it looks like to us. We are reading The Three Little Pigs and then making the pigs' houses out of boxes. The Preschoolers will make 3 little pigs' puppets and acting out the story.

The preschoolers are also continuing to learn their letter sounds. We have 5 more single letter sounds to learn. All of the children have made progress with learning sounds. It is exciting to see them use this letter sound knowledge when 'reading' and writing!

Writing is an everyday occurrence in Preschool. Children sign in when they arrive and need to sign up for Centers. They also draw and write in journals and for book pages. These are great authentic writing activities.

As you can see, Preschool is never a boring place to be!
