

The students participating in the project were required to familiarize themselves with Constitution-related issues. A quiz was completed by each participating student. An essay question accompanied the quiz in case of a tie. This year's essay topic involved Constitutional questions centered on Presidential Pardon power and protection of Special Counsel Investigations. Students were asked to consider the nature of Separation of Powers as it relates to the executive and legislative branches of government.

<u>News from Mrs. Lange</u>

It's hard to believe that the first half of the year is over, and we are in semester two already. The 7th graders, 8th graders, and Algebra I students have been

working diligently to advance their knowledge on the topics we have been learning. For the 7th graders those topics include: working with negative numbers, solving equations for the first time, solving inequalities, rates, ratios, and proportions. The 8th graders have been studying how to work with functions, graph linear equations, and solving systems of equations, all while also advancing on topics they learned last year. In Algebra I, we are repeating some of the curriculum learned in 8th grade, but taking it to the next level. They too are learning about functions, but now know function notation and domain & range. They also revisited linear functions, but learned two new forms of linear equations and direct variation. They are also solving systems of equations, but the equations are more complex. We are hoping to finish the year as strongly as we started it.



<u>Mathematical Matters by Mr.</u> <u>Hamann</u>

As we settle into the second semester, students are eagerly working on their learning targets in class. Much like

previous years, the students work hard at practicing with these topics, doing homework and formative assessments, before their progress is tested on a summative assessment. For those of you who have not yet asked their math student about topic currently being studied, here is a glimpse into what each of my 2^{nd} semester classes is tackling.

The students in **Algebra 2** just finished up a big chapter all about quadratics and will now be starting to explore polynomial functions. They will be practicing some advanced solving techniques and learning about the Fundamental Theorem of Algebra.

Algebra III students have been diving into statistical measures and finding various probabilities and will soon be moving on to topics in Trigonometry. This class tends to be very intensive for students as the targets we lay out for them are advanced, requiring a deeper level of thinking, but both sections of this class seem up for the challenge.

This semester has just two upper-level math offerings that are challenging our juniors and seniors. The **Statistics** class is exploring ways to display various data and methods for effectively collecting that data. This course contains topics that many students bound for a post-secondary institution will likely face. **Calculus** is a semester long class emphasizing topics relating to limits, derivatives, and integrals. Calculus is a logical choice for students wanting to pursue a post-secondary education in the hard sciences and engineering fields.

All of my classes are also working hard on projects as we prepare for **Pi Day** coming up in March. For anyone familiar with the never-ending, transcendental number pi, my memorization record for someone reciting digits of pi currently stands at 260 digits. Please ask your student what type of project they are preparing for our in-class celebration.

<u>News from Mrs. Trenkamp</u> Six Ways Chores Can Help Your Child Become More Responsible It's a fact: Responsible children do better

in school. And they grow up to become productive, responsible adults. One of the most effective ways to help children develop responsibility is through family chores. Chores help your child:

1. Build school skills. Learning how to follow directions and complete chores correctly gives your child practice for following directions when taking tests. They will also learn to accept authority figures and do what is asked of them.

2. Feel like she is needed. Let's face it—this is something everyone needs. So be sure to recognize your child's contribution. "Elena unloaded the dishwasher this afternoon, so cleaning up after dinner tonight will be much faster!

3. Develop planning and time management skills. Figuring out when to complete chores helps your child learn how to prioritize tasks and plan her time.

4. Feel a sense of investment. A child who has swept the floor is less likely to track in mud from outdoors.

5. Take pride in her work. This feeling of satisfaction can carry over to times when she faces a daunting task for school, like finishing a long-term project.

6. Learn basic life skills. Before your child leaves home, she should know things like how to prepare simple meals, care for her clothes and take out the garbage. The sooner she learns these lessons, the more prepared she will be for the future.

It is great that Winter will slowly be turning to Spring soon! The school year is flying by!

Currently in preschool we are beginning a Ramp Study. So, what does this mean? This means that we are using the children's interest in ramps/vehicles to explore important social studies and science concepts and use skills in literacy, math, technology and the arts. A Ramp Study, involving inclined planes, engages children in investigations involving force and motion, fosters the development of important science inquiry skills, and provides numerous opportunities for integration across curricular domains. In addition, ramp activities are super fun!

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The preschoolers are also continuing to learn their letter sounds. We have 5 more single letter sounds to learn. All of the children have made progress with learning sounds. It is exciting to see them use this letter sound knowledge when reading and writing!

Writing is an everyday occurrence in Preschool. Children sign in when they arrive and need to sign up for Centers. They also draw and write in journals and for book pages. These are great authentic writing activities.

<u>News from Mrs. Schulte</u>

6th grade scientists are studying 6 of our human body systems and how they

interact with the other body systems. They have

researched a system of their



choice on their own, then grouped up with classmates to put together a class to teach their peers - complete with visuals, models, activities, quizzes, etc. Dr. Hauser form the

Edgewood Vet Clinic came to dissect a piglet with us.



It was a great learning experience for them to study body systems and then get to see and touch actual body parts and systems of the pig.

In 5th grade science news, students have been learning about the four spheres that make up our Earth. The atmosphere, geosphere, hydrosphere, and biosphere.



Now, they are continuing on even further into the biosphere, learning about Energy from the Sun and the Energy Pyramid, food chains, food webs, and ecosystems and that all energy in our ecosystems was once energy from the Sun. They are researching an animal and its effect on the ecosystem. They need to determine what would happen, if anything, to the rest of the ecosystem if this animal disappeared. They will make an info graphic to share with their classmates about their animal, its habitat, what it



prays upon (or eats) and what preys upon it, where it fits into the Energy Pyramid, and most importantly, its importance to the ecosystem.

News from Mrs. Anderegg



Well, we are more than half way through this very different and crazy school year (finally)! The special education world at the elementary has been busy catching up

on progress monitoring and alternate assessment testing after Christmas break. Because winter testing is over, special education teachers are looking closer at student data to see how much progress they've made and whether changes need to be made or not in an IEP (individual education plan) or if instructional changes need to be made.

For students who have an IEP that participate in Iowa Assessments, special education teachers track their progress on a graph. Usually, if there are four or more data points at or above the aim line (a line on their graph showing where we want the student to be toward his or her progress), the IEP goal could be changed or the student could be exited from their IEP. If progress monitoring shows the student below the aim line for more than 4 data points, changes need to be made either to their IEP, or in what the special education teacher is instructing.

For students who have an IEP that participate in Iowa's Alternate Assessment, the same procedures take place, except they usually are not exited from their IEP. The special education teacher also has to review alternate assessment data and evidence to decide the level the student is currently at.

Depending on the grade level of the student, students on alternate assessment are instructed based off of something called the Iowa Core Essential Elements, which is like the regular grade level Iowa Core Standards. The Iowa Core Essential Elements are broken down into smaller steps and different levels. These levels help guide a special education teacher in deciding whether or not to move down or up a level in what a student can do.

Needless to say, the teachers and students have all been working very hard all year long. My favorite part of teaching is seeing student growth, and I have seen a lot this year! I look forward to seeing what strides my students have made come spring.

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District News News from Superintendent Busch

The middle of the school year is a great time for families to check with students on goals. Setting academic and personal goals help to motivate, energize, and

focus students, and it is a valuable skill that will benefit learners throughout their lives. The Leader in Me program has helped teach some of these goal setting skills, but parents still can play a big role in helping students set and achieve these goals. Hopefully, some of these goals will include giving best efforts on upcoming assessments.

The second semester is also a very busy testing period for elementary students. We are currently completing the assessments for the Iowa Tier FAST that all students, Kindergarten through 6th grade must take. The elementary FAST test will be given again along with the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP-replaced Iowa Tests of Basic Skills) which will be given in April and May for 3rd through 11th grades.


Because parents and community members are the most powerful voices at the Capitol, Parents for Great Iowa Schools usually partners with the Iowa Association of School Board for a "Day at the Capitol" to advocate for strong public schools. Due to COVID-19, these events have been changed to virtual events. Please check on Parents for Great Iowa Schools on their website: <u>https://p4gis.org/</u> Conversations about school finance can be so very difficult to comprehend are the various funding streams that school districts operate from. The three areas of current focus are the general fund, State Penny (SAVE) extension, and debt service (bond issues). For more information about school finance, please view

The **general fund** revenues come from state aid, property taxes, income surtaxes, federal funds, grants, and donations. These dollars are used to pay staff, energy cost, curriculum and supplies, and transportation costs. The key elements are the number of students and the State set cost per student for the general fund. **Debt service** funds are used to cover the cost of the construction of buildings from property tax. Property valuations in the school district are key for the debt service.
