# <u>News from Ms. Helgemoe</u> Freshman Physics

It seems that only yesterday we were beginning the school year, it is hard to believe that we are already a quarter of

the way through! The freshman started out this year by reviewing the scientific method, why it is important and how it works. They were able to create their own lab to determine, Which Paper Towel Brand is the Best? I think they were all shocked at the results of their experience and have a better understanding of how to create and run an experiment. After finishing our chapter on the scientific method we moved into Linear Motion, with a focus on speed. Next the students will be going into Linear Motion with a focus on acceleration, before beginning investigations on all three of Newton's Law.

## **News from Miss Edens**

The 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade students have been hard at work with our activities and projects in English! I am a new teacher at Ed-Co and it's been a joy getting to work

with the junior high students this fall.

In 8th grade English, we wrapped up our argumentative essay in mid-October. The 8th graders chose a topic related to sustainability or agriculture (or both!) and developed a unique argument about the topic. After researching their topic, they worked through the writing process; drafting, receiving feedback, and revising to create a well-developed essay. The revision process requires critical thinking and these students accepted the challenge! They revised particular sections and sentences in their essay, along with looking at specific word choice. The 8th grade students should be very proud of how much they improved as writers during this unit!

In 7<sup>th</sup> grade English, we are concluding our short story writing unit. After reading several short stories in the beginning of the school year, students had the opportunity to become writers and create their own short stories. The unique challenge was to start with a theme and develop the message throughout the plot of the story. The students have done an excellent job of delivering the theme through the conflict, characters, and plot of their story. The 7<sup>th</sup> graders are a group of talented creative writers and they've enjoyed having the freedom to tell their stories through the writing process. As we transition from the short story unit to our unit on the news, the 7<sup>th</sup> graders are continuing to think about how stories unfold.



# <u>News From</u> <u>Ms. Helgemoe/Mr. Millis</u> Environmental Science



As we finish the first quarter of school and this school year seems to have just begun, we are also closing the door on another exciting year of environmental science. It seems to be perfect timing too, as the



threat of freezing temperatures is in the near future. Though, when we began our journey into the field, the summer heat was

still blazing. I am sure that the students enjoyed our trips to the river to test for macroinvertebrates to get a better understanding of the quality of the Volga River. The students also took transects to map the river and be able to look at the river in cross sections based on depth and velocity of the water. When the

river was too high for us to do any work, we were able to keep the students busy by reading Aldo Leopold's *A Sand County Almanac*. The students were able to live one of the



experiences that Leopold describes in his book, by using a 2 person saw to cut a tree section with an approximately 30cm diameter, just as Leopold does. After completing all of the class work, students went to work on cleaning up the Volga River, by removing more than 15 tires and countless other pieces of trash. And then, just as the leaves were



beginning to change colors, we made our way into the timber. Learning the ins and outs of managing timber, the students were able to determine the density of a forest, pick out their

own crop trees, determine trees to remove to help their crop trees grow and determine the value of trees in the forest. We would like to send a huge shout out to Jim and Jodi Kerns, without their generous help this class would not be possible! We appreciate everything you do and thank you for allowing us the opportunity to teach our students about the environment

that surrounds them!





#### News from Mrs. Lange

I can't believe we are almost done with the first quarter of the school year already. It feels like only a week ago we started. The 7<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> grade math classes

are off to a great start for the year. The 7th graders have adjusted well to being in a new school building. and to having all new teachers. We are excited to see what the year holds. The first few days of math were spent getting to know each other, outlining what would be learned this year, reviewing some 6th grade topics, learning problem solving strategies, and we have just recently finished our first unit. It may seem like it took us quite a while to get through, but we are starting off with some brand new concepts for them. They include: learning about negative numbers: how to work with them, what negative fractions and decimals are, ordering these numbers, and will move to adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing them. Our next unit, we will begin working with variables and solving equations.

The 8th graders are excited to be back, and we were able to jump in to our first unit almost right away. They learned about square roots of numbers, and how to classify a number as rational or irrational. They took this knowledge into learning about the Pythagorean Theorem. We are now wrapping up our second unit on solving equations. Much of it was review from last year, but we also introduced some new and more challenging problems as well. Finally, the freshmen have been cruising right along. We breezed through our first unit on working with rational and irrational numbers, solving equations, and now solving inequalities. We are taking all the things we learned in junior high a step further. In all the classes we are working on enhancing our critical thinking skills.

# News from Mrs. Wille 7th grade Life Science classes We are currently studying the characteristics of life to determine if something is living, dead or nonliving. Student's have been applying what they

know to create a RAFT project. This isn't a floating boat project, but rather a project that has a ROLE, AUDIENCE, FORMAT and a TOPIC. A RAFT project allows student choice in how they show me what they know. This year some students are writing letters, some are creating passports and others are preparing Snapchat stories. Once we finish learning about the characteristics of life we will move onto cells

#### 10th grade Conceptual Chemistry classes

This group of students just finished learning about atomic structure. While studying atomic structure, students were introduced to a brief history of the atom and how to use the periodic table. Our next unit of study will apply what students learned about atomic structure to how atoms combine to create compounds. We will be studying ionic and covalent bonding and testing each bond type for specific properties in the lab.

#### **Advanced College Chemistry class**

The last few weeks, students have spent time reviewing all they learned in conceptual chemistry. Some of the concepts of review included the law of conservation of mass, naming and writing formulas for compounds and stoichiometry. As we move forward we will apply what we know about stoichiometry and specifically do reactions to predict empirical formulas and identify limiting reactants. We got word that Loras College will again hold THE

Chemistry Olympics so we will begin preparing for that as well.

#### **Research and Design class**

Have you ever tried to read and understand a peer reviewed scientific article? If you have, you know first hand how challenging it can be. This year I am offering a class to teach students about the research process. So far this year we have learned what peer reviewed articles are, how to read them and how to write article reviews. After some practice writing article reviews we have plans to prepare a literature review of our research. The topic we are presently exploring is herbal remedies for respiratory health.



#### News from Mr. Millis

Mr. Mills' 8th grade environmental science class started out the school year by putting the finishing touches on a 2 year project. All the 8th graders participated in

maintaining and adding to the native prairie restoration storm water management project along the west boundary of the high School parking lot. The project was started in 2019 when that years' class measured and planned the project before Covid 19 put a hold on it until the following year. In 2020

the 8<sup>th</sup> grade placed field stone for erosions control and completed the first planting of



native prairie species specifically adapted to extend a root system and hold soil in place during storm events.

Another planting was completed this fall by a  $3^{\rm rd}$  class of  $8^{\rm th}$  graders who removed invasive weeds that came up over the summer and added another 600 prairie plants.

The entire project was truly a team effort as several parents donated time, materials and equipment to make it happen. Jim Kerns sprayed herbicide to remove the existing turf, Matt Gaul provided the needed tillage to prepare for planting, and Mike Gaul



hauled in several loads of field stone. All the work and materials were provided at no cost to the district and allowed for grant funds to be concentrated on purchase of native prairie plants



The project was full of challenges starting with the covid pandemic and delayed it a full year, to

weather, to problems with the supply chain for new plants but the rewards of a job seen through and done well proved well worth it. It will provide erosion control and protection for the neighboring farm field, new habitat for pollinators, and a full season native prairie flower garden for students, staff and visitors to enjoy. This was a real life learning experience for all the students involved. They had to

plan it out, adjust their plans when necessary, and provide the hard manual labor during all phases that made it possible.





#### News from Ms. Wall

We just finished the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of school and conferences are right around the corner. I am the new English 10 and 11 teacher this school year at Ed-Co and I

have loved getting to know and work with your students so far! In English 10 we have just finished up reading Hamlet as part of our world literature focus for this class. It took us a little bit to get through Hamlet but Shakespeare can be tough for anyone, these kids handled it wonderfully though and engaged in all kinds of deeper level critical thinking. They have worked so hard on learning about characterization and the complex ways that characters are created and move a story. We did all kinds of interesting ways to put ourselves in the characters shoes throughout the play. The students got creative in our class by making character playlists, considering what the characters social media might look like, and even making connections if the characters had been students at Ed-Co today. The next unit we will be working on is a research writing unit that I plan to submit some student essays to the World Food Prize competition later in the spring. The 11th graders are finishing up our Early American voices unit which included Native American stories, a look at the explorer's writings, the early settler's accounts, and some other historical documents. The students are finishing the 1st portion of their over arching paper about what it means to be an American in literature. We are doing this paper in chunks as we go through each unit and add new ideas of what it means to be an American in the texts we read, as well as what it means to the students

themselves. They are working really hard on combining the elements necessary for their paper along with connecting the texts we have read with their own ideas of what it means to be an American. All my classes are also working on critical thinking and making the real world connections to what we are doing in the classroom.

# **Mathematical Matters** by Mr. Hamann

Learning is once again in full swing in the math department, and students are eagerly working on their learning targets in class. Much like previous years, the students work hard at practicing with these topics, doing homework and formative assessments, before their progress is tested on a summative assessment. For those of you who have not yet asked their math student about topics currently being studied, here is a glimpse into what each of my 1st semester classes is tackling.

The students in **Algebra 2** have been reviewing some basic solving techniques and are working hard on creating equations that describe relationships. They are also spending time interpreting the structure of expressions and practicing their evaluating skills. **Algebra III** students have been working hard on the topic of rational functions and their structure. This class tends to be very intensive for students as the targets we lay out for them are advanced, requiring a deeper level of thinking, but both sections of this class seem up for the challenge.

Statistics will again be offered at Ed-Co, but as a second semester class. **Statistics** is a topic that many students bound for a post-secondary institution will likely face. We felt it was wise to give them the basics of statistics to give them success later on, so this course is geared for any student who has completed our regular math progression. What is Digital Citizenship? Why is This Important?

When I start our digital citizenship lessons off with my students, something I always catch myself thinking is, "We didn't have to do this when I was in elementary school!" I share this with my students as a way to get them to understand how quickly technology is evolving. As technology is becoming a bigger part of our lives (we are doing remarkable things!) a bigger focus is being put on students to understand what it means to be a digital citizen. Digital citizenship is the set of behaviors and standards that we should practice when using technology. Just like we want our students to behave in a responsible, respectful way in public spaces, we want them to do this when they are using their devices. The elementary students have been learning why it's important to be aware and respectful of other people when using devices, reflecting on how their media choices can impact the way they feel, and deciding what a healthy media balance looks like for them. Kindergarten students even learned the Pause, Breath, and Finish Up routine for when we don't want to close out of our fun games, but are asked to. We have also discussed the difference between private and personal information as well as what information we should keep to ourselves. When students learn digital citizenship it helps to equip them with the knowledge, skills, and resources to succeed using technology as a learning tool but also

as a means of fun. Learning digital citizenship also teaches students how to engage in the digital environment feeling confident and doing so responsibly.

#### **News from Superintendent Busch**

Dear Ed-Co Community,
I am writing to provide a quick reminder that there will be a bond issue question on the ballot for Ed-Co Schools on Tuesday, November 2.

If approved, the bond issue would enable us to move forward on a series of projects to address our schools' most pressing facility needs. We would be able to do so while locking in historically low interest rates.

There will be two questions on the ballot:

- · Question #1 asks voters to allow the Board of Education to issue \$12,050,000 in General Obligation Bonds to provide the funds necessary to move forward with the identified projects.
- Question #2 asks voters to approve an increase in the tax levy above \$2.70, but not more than \$4.05, per every \$100,000 of assessed property value within the district boundaries.

If both questions are approved with at least 60% voting yes, the district would be able to move forward with:

- · Upgrades to mechanical and heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems at our elementary school
- · New career and technical education spaces
- · Improved accessibility in the Jr./Sr. High School building
- $\cdot$  Improved student and traffic safety at the Jr./ Sr. High School
- · New competition gym

The district would use a mix of income surtax and property taxes to reduce the burden on property owners and to keep the overall district tax rate levy below the 20-year average. To that end, an approved bond would result in a \$2 tax levy rate increase and would have a property tax impact of \$103/year on a home with an assessed value of \$100,000. That would equal an additional \$8.59/month.

Thank you for allowing us to educate your children this year. As always, I ask that you please become involved with the educational opportunities for our young people and assist us in making Edgewood-Colesburg the best school in the State of Iowa. I thank you for taking the time to read these articles as we proceed through a very exciting 2021-2022 school year. If you have ideas for improvement or areas of

# "Skip the Trip" program offered at Edgewood-Colesburg CSD

"Skip the Trip," is a program from the Iowa Department of Transportation that allows students to take the permit test, non-commercial driver's knowledge test, online. The Iowa DOT has approved educational sites to administer the test using an electronic device, which saves parents time away from work and students' time away from school. If a student does not pass the first time, they can take it again 24 hours later and skip the multiple trips to the courthouse.

Secondary Principal, Dawn Voss, is certified to administer the test at Ed-Co. After the test is completed, the student will receive an email with the test results. Once the student has passed the test, the parent and student will need to visit a DOT service center or county treasurer's office to get their instructional permit.

# **Edgewood-Colesburg Community School Emergency School Closure Process**

As the winter weather season gets ready to begin, Edgewood-Colesburg Community Schools will continue to evaluate the process it uses to decide when to close schools due to bad weather and how to best alert parents and students about the closure.

The district is aware of the implications of emergency school closures. We realize when schools shut down parents must make alternative plans, bus and food services must be altered, class and test schedules must change, and events must be canceled. We also feel strongly that our students' education can best be served when they are in class; however, safety is our number one priority. We will always do what is best to safeguard the well-being of our students and staff, but sometimes closing schools is not the obvious choice. The school district covers almost the width of an entire county. There have been times when the weather has changed, road conditions have deteriorated, or a storm has stalled over the area that a last-minute decision has been made to close. These late decisions are made to protect our students and staff. There are many factors that are considered.

The images of our bus drivers on slippery roads, of young children standing at frozen bus stops, and teens, or their parents, driving in hazardous conditions is always present when the decision is made to close schools. Once the decision is made, the Edgewood-Colesburg Community Schools must disseminate the message quickly to the media, staff, and parents.

\*Some stations get the information on faster than others. The best advice is to listen to more than one so our information is not overlooked.

Since parents are the primary protectors, they will need to decide what is best for their children regardless of any decision by the school district. The option to keep children home when weather conditions are extreme is always at the parents' discretion and the school understands and respects the decision. Parents can contact the school and

arrange for an excused student absence. All families should make advanced arrangement for their children in case of school closures and for the rare situation when it is necessary to close school because of a power failure or another circumstance. Children should know where to go if a parent will not be home and how to contact parents and guardians. Make sure your parent contact information, including work telephone numbers, are kept up-to-date with the school.

During cold weather you should always make sure your child is dressed appropriately. Bulky coats and boots can be stored in classrooms, or other areas designated by the principal in addition to student lockers so don't be afraid to bundle them up. Working together we can ensure the safety of the Edgewood-Colesburg Community Schools during the hazardous weather season.
